The Great Floods in the Tyrol.

Berne, Sept. 2.—Telegrams concerning the floods in the Tyrol say that the flood area is much greater than it was in 1888, and the damage has been immense, although as yet but two human lives have been lost so far as it is known. All railroad travel through the afflicted districts is stopped. Some dams have been broken down and partially carried away. Those people who still remain in the neighborhood live in upper stories of their houses, while many have even been driven to the roofs.
