## BROCK.

## ESSEX.

Four large rattlesnakes, three feet long, were killed on the Dobson farm, adjacent to the Patterson farm, where the volunteers range is, and the boys will hereafter use them while shooting.

Curry Creek Farm, near Windsor, recently purchased by a Detroit syndicate, is to be stocked with Clydesdale and thoroughbred horses. The former has been selected from Canadian farms, and the latter from Kentucky.

Mr. Bolus, representing a party of Ann Arbor capitalists, is testing the soil with a view of purchasing it and establishing a cranberry marsh. The land will be dyked, drained and filled in.

At the meeting of the license commissioners for South Essex on Wednesday, licenses for the balance of the year were granted to Addelman and Womsey, of Amherstburg, and three months' extension was granted to the following, on account of the local option appeal case not yet being decided: Scott House, Hoffman House, and Luck House, Leamington; Royal Hotel and American Hotel, Essex; Commercial Hotel and Erie House, Wheatley. No license was granted for the Denning House, Leamington.

The young lady had been suffering from hemorrhage of the lungs and was out driving with her brother on the evening of June 9, when the horse stepped into a hole in the black pavement, left by the careless driver of a city car, and the young lady was thrown out and received a severe shock, which, it is felt, has much to do with her present condition.

C. P. Gray's horse Silver Star is entered for the big Buffalo race meeting this week. George Honsinger, of Bayham, whose name is in connection with the alleged kidnapping of a child has become well known throughout the country, has been acquitted by Judge Brantingher on a charge of assault.

Capt. Thomas Harbottle, of Toronto, Government inspector of steamboats, was at Port Stanley on official business on Friday.

Owing to the heavy passenger business on the M. C. R. the local freight trains will have to be cancelled this week.

On Monday night some persons entered the house of Mr. D. Blue and Mr. Elmer, near Dunt, and got away with a watch from each place.

James Parry, Vienna, has been found guilty on the charge of assaulting James M. Miller, a traveling jeweler, in Bayham.

Owen Sound has abandoned the scheme of holding a summer carnival this year. Wheat will average from 35 to 40 bushels per acre in most localities in Grey this year.

## HURON.

Frederick Cole, of Lunenburg, met with a very painful accident on Tuesday afternoon, while endeavoring to lower himself from a moving away wheat, he caught hold of a brace, which was a support to one of the beams in the mill, and he gave way, falling him fall to the floor with such force as to break both arms at the wrists.

Mr. and Mrs. Walter Taylor, of Wingham, went to Toronto on Tuesday to receive a portion of the estate left to Mrs. Taylor by an uncle who died in Australia about two years ago. The ladies of Trinity Church Woman's Guild met at the Rhyll rectory recently and presented Mrs. Racey with a handsome silver cup and saucer, accompanied by an address, as a token of remembrance, and to show their appreciation of her usefulness and generous nature. The family have left for Belmont, where Mr. Racey has been appointed rector.

## HALDIMAND.

Wm. Hanna, of Dunn, sustained serious injury by falling from a mow on Saturday. Some ribs were broken.

Rev. R. Macknight, the popular pastor of the Dunnville Church, has been elected moderator of the Hamilton Presbytery.

At the recent annual examination of pupils in Dunnville for entrance to the high school Miss Mary Michener, of No. 5, Sherbrooke, headed the list with a total of 745 marks. It is doubtful whether this standing is surpassed in the Province.

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Dr. Bryce, of the Ontario Board of Health, thinks there is no danger of a further outbreak of anthrax among cattle in the vicinity of Acton so long as stock is not allowed to graze on the fields along the Acton Creek. It is difficult to kill the germs of the disease, but as these are not to be found on the high lands, all that is necessary in order to avoid serious consequences is to pasture the stock on such lands.

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The Hamilton police raided a gambling den a few evenings ago, and arrested all the players. The keepers were fined \$70 and each player \$25, making a total of \$365.

Angus Campbell, whose name has recently sprung into prominence, as the inventor of the Lone Star cotton-picking machine, at 17 years of age he made his start in life, and alone, going to Hamilton, where fortune favored him so far that he was able to obtain an apprenticeship in a pattern shop.

His latest talent was here developed. About eleven years ago he went to Chicago, and various machines show evidence of his skillful touch. About five years ago his attention was directed to the difficulties attending the construction of a mechanical cotton picker. One hundred million dollars is what it cost to pick the cotton crop of the United States last year. Campbell's machine, once introduced, will save 35 per cent. of that cost. The cotton gin by Whitney was of stupendous interest to the world, and Campbell has invented a cotton-picker, the complement of the gin.
