# Still Unsettled.

Another Meeting Necessary to Deal With Electric Railway Matters.

Disagreement Encountered Relative to Bridge Crossing.

Ald. Dreaney Gives an Important Casting Vote-Route Suggested and Discussed.

The electric railway franchise took a turn for the worse about 4:30 on Saturday afternoon, and absolute rest will be required before this coquettish piece of paper can be discussed again. For reasons which will appear further on progress will be reported at tonight's meeting of the city council, and the committee will meet again about the middle of the week. It was all because of the bridges-and Ald. Dreaney's casting vote! The meeting began in the best of humor and ended in the same way. But about half way through a breach between the company and the committee appeared which was only prevented from becoming a serious rupture by the moderation of both parties. Ald. Dreaney was moved into the chair to facilitate matters until Ald. Jones appeared, and Mr. Jones when he did arrive courteously allowed the man from ward 5 to continue to hold the reins. Mayor Little, Ald. Carrothers, Ald. Armstrong, Ald. McCallum and Ald. Brener were also present. The meeting began with a discussion between Mr. Ivey and Ald. Dreaney as to whether Egerton street was the first side road this side of Ingersoll merely the dividing line between Dorchester and Nilestown. This important point had not been settled when a quor-

um was announced. "It's too bad," said Manager Carr (who was present) to the chairman, as the meeting adjourned, "that Ald. Dreaney should be the only man standing between horse cars and electricity.' "Well, I was voting for the city, not the company," replied Ald. Dreaney.
THE LABOR DIFFICULTY
SETTLED.

"I suppose we might as well go on with the 'Knights of Labor' clause,' said Mayor Little. Ald. Dreaney read it as follows: Clause 4-Ten hours to constitute a

working day; the average week's labor in any month not to exceed 60 hours. "That is so you can make it eleven hours one week and nine hours another," said Ald. Dreaney.

After a discussion in which Ald. Carrothers wished to stipulate the wages and to which Mr. Ivey refused to acquiesce the clause was adopted. It was pointed out that it was satisfactory to the representatives of the labor councils. THE BRIDGE DIFFICULTY.

The bridge clause read as follows: 10-Should the extensions required by the city make it necessary to cross Clark's bridge, the company to have the right to cross the same on the present structure, replanking and strengthening the same if necessary to the satisfaction of the city. The company to have the right, in so far as the city has the power to grant it, of extending the abutments of Dundas street bridge and building a bridge for its own use at the side. The company to have the option of either extending the abutments of Victoria bridge and building their own superstructure, or to replace the present structure with a new twenty-foot roadway. The material in the old bridge to be allowed the company, they to have a half proprietary interest in the new superstructure. The company to have the option of either extending the abutments of the York street bridge and building their own superstructure or to remove the present structure and replace it with a new twenty-foot roadway on the same terms as those relating to Victoria bridge, or to have the further option of building their own bridge across the river at the foot of King street, in which case the bridge and abutments will be the sole property of the company. The city to grant the privilege in so far as they have the power of crossing Oxford street bridge upon the same terms as relate to Clark's bridge. The company to have the right to place double tracks on any twenty-

foot roadway bridge if there is a double track on the street up to the bridge. THE STORM BREWED.
"Now, gentlemen," said Mr. Ivey,
"we have tried to meet you there." But the aldermen objected to the triple option wanted by the company. They wanted the company to make a positive declaration of which method they would adopt to get over the difficulty. Failing in that, the aldermen wanted the city to have the option of saying which course should be pursued. The aldermen pointed out that Stanley street would have to be releveled and the lawns demolished, and sidewalks moved back to their original position. Then the amount of farm traffic passing over the bridge was urged against its use, and the committee tried to get Mr. Ivey to consent to build a new bridge at King street. Mr. Ivey put forward the argument that Becher street was not in it with Stanley as a paying line, and still wanted the option of crossing York street. The mayor said that he personally would hold out against the crossing of York street. "Well," said Mr. Ivey, "we can split

just as easily on bridges as on fares, or routes, or anything else." And the mayor proceeded to point out that the farmers had Blackfriars bridge to enter the city on the west side, on which no cars would be crossing. He held that the city should have a similar entrance on the south. There were bound to be accidents, and the damages that would have to be paid might just

as well be expended now on bridges.
AND IT BROKE. "Nothing short of what is there, so far as we are concerned, will go through," said Mr. Ivey. Continuing, he said that he had been twitted on the street and in the newspapers for con-tinually backing down to the city's wishes, and he would give in no further. Mayor Little again objected to the use of the York street bridge, and stated that he was prepared to take the responsibility of refusing the fran-chise on behalf of the city. "And I am prepared to take it on behalf of the company," retorted Mr.

The aldermen were grave and silent and Mr. Ivey resolute and uncomprom-

"I think we had better adjourn until we get in a little better humor," one of the members suggested sotto voce. Ald. Jones broke the silence by again asking Mr. Ivey to build the King street bridge and strengthen Clark's bridge. "You have between now and Monday night," said he to Mr. Ivey, "Will you write to Mr. Everett?" "I will not write a single line to Mr. Everett," said Mr. Ivey sharply.

Ald. Jones—If you refuse right here to build the King street bridge why do you put it in the clause?

Mr. Ivey—Because you want me to build on King street and not give me the option of any of the other methods of crossing. IVEY'S NEW PROPOSITION.

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Ivey thought for a minute and then made a new proposition to the committee. "I tell you what I will do," "We will use Clark's, York street and Victoria bridges, and add a side structure and new superstructure on each."

"Gentlemen," said Ald. Jones, "I will accept it for one."
Mr. Ivey-That is to apply the Vic-

toria bridge proposal to the whole three. Ald. Jones-But I understood you to say that you would put an extended

abutment on the whole three. I am still willing to accept it. Ald. Parnell, who was in the room, here asked permission to speak. He rather favored the Stanley street route, provided one track only was laid down, and that the company would build around the bridge. Then there would be no necessity of removing boulevards. Mr. Parnell also pointed out that the farm traffic, even if the road went down Becher street, was sure to meet the line on Askin and the Wharncliffe.

Mr. Ivey said that they could operate the street with a single track, but would need a long switch at the curve on the hill leading over the railway bridge. ALD. DREANEY CASTS THE DIE.

Then Ald. Carrothers pressed his motion that the city have the option as to the manner in which the river should be crossed. Mayor Little, Ald. Brener and Car-

rothers supported it—3.
Nays—Ald. Jones, McCallum and Armstrong-3 This left Ald. Dreaney, who was in the
