JOHNSON'S OFFER.

London, July 20.—Tom Eck, who trains John S. Johnson, the American champion, says he has offered to match Johnson for 1,000 francs against the winner of the Grand Prix de France, ridden on Sunday last. Johnson will attend the meeting of the League of American Wheelmen at Louisville, Ky., on Aug. 18, with the world triplet, the Jellie brothers and Bonnett. Johnson and Eck think the Catford track the fastest they ever saw, and that the English tracks are all fast, very safe, and compare well with the American tracks.

London, July 20.—At Catford Saturday the American bicyclist, John S. Johnson, rode a mile in 1:44 1/5. He was paced by tandems.

RECORD BREAKING IN ENGLAND.

London, July 20.—At the Woodson track on Saturday Barden and Part beat the tandem bicycle records for two from two to five miles. They covered the latter distance in 9 minutes, 2-5 seconds.

CIRCUIT RACES AT WINDSOR.

Windsor, Ont., July 20.—Two thousand five hundred people saw twelve men start in the one-mile professional, 2:20 class Saturday. The event of the day was the breaking of the world's record of 2:01 flying start by Morgan and Wright's triplet team, who made the mile with a flying start in 1:56, knocking 5 seconds off the record. Earl Osherson, the 19-year-old champion, lowered his record of 3:39 4-5 to 3:27 4-5. Lee Richardson gave an exhibition of remarkably clever fancy and trick riding. STANBURY TO ROW GAUDAU.

London, July 20.—Tom Sullivan, who is agent for James Stanbury, the champion sculler of Australia, in the negotiations for a match with Jacob Gaudau, of Canada, says that a cable dispatch will be sent today accepting Gaudau's counter proposition to row for £1,250. It is proposed to row the race on the Thames River early in September. The race will be rowed 125 for expenses. Early in September is selected as the date for the contest, because Stanbury must return to Australia immediately after that time.

THE INCANDESCENT LIGHT

Some of the Curious or Commonplace Uses to Which It is Put.

Incandescent electric lights are used to illuminate the eyes of mounted animals, bears, tigers, and lions, shown by curriers. Here obviously, a light with a flame would not do, while the incandescent light answers the purpose well and conveniently. The wire is run from the head down the back of the animal's body, and out through one of its feet to a connection with the service wire of the store.

Incandescent lights are used in refrigerators, such as the ice boxes of the wholesale dealer in cut flowers and the butcher. Their use in sidewalk show cases is familiar; in dressing shop windows the flexible connection admits of placing the light where it is wanted with each new trimming of the window.

They are used in electric signs, some of which are portable, while others are formed of letters that are movable, like types, so that the sign can be readily changed as often as may be desired. Electric numbers are made in the same way.

One may see a painter at work at night in a store, paint brush in one hand and electric light with the wire trailing away back of him; the other, to enable him to see the better in some nook or cranny that he is painting.

The incandescent lamp is used to light sidewalk awnings. The lamps are strung along a wire hung under the ridge pole inside the awning; the wire and lamps are simply taken in when the awning is. Movable billboards are illuminated in the same manner.

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Close of a Useful Career.

Mrs. Youmans, a Founder of the W. C. T. U., Passes Away.

She Had Been a Sufferer for Several Years—Biographical Notes.

Toronto, July 20.—Mrs. Letitia Creighton Youmans, honorary president of the W. C. T. U., and Canada's most prominent lady temperance worker, died on Saturday at her residence, 19 Metcalfe street. Mrs. Youmans had almost reached the allotted span of life, having been born Jan. 3, 1827, and being consequently in her 70th year.

The little village of Baltimore, some few miles north of Cobourg, in the county of Northumberland, has the honor of being her birthplace. She was of mixed parentage, her father being Irish, and her mother an American of French extraction. Her father, John Creighton, was one of the early pioneers of this country. Letitia began her school life at the age of 4, being sent to an old log school house under the tuition of a Yankee schoolmaster. Here she learned those temperance principles which she had ever since advocated, and signed the pledge. At great personal sacrifice her father removed her to a ladies' school opened in Cobourg by Prof. Van Norman. At the age of 20 she creditably graduated and began teaching in her own school section. Here, as at Pictou Ladies' Academy, where she afterwards taught, she strove in every way to inculcate those principles to which she devoted her long and useful life. She married in 1850 Thomas Youmans, an ardent supporter in her work.

In 1874 she first became interested in concerted temperance action, assisting in the organization of the W. C. T. U. in the United States. Returning, she began her work in this country by petitioning the Pictou town council against the licensing of houses. She addressed the council board, but the petition was thrown out. Undismayed, she continued the work, addressing large audiences at Montreal, Cobourg, Port Hope, and in Toronto, where she came to live. Here she spoke under the auspices of the Temperance Reformation Society, in churches, public halls, at the Central Prison, and at the Haven. She also addressed large meetings at Cincinnati and assisted to form unions at Hamilton, Dundas, Brantford, London and other places.

Mrs. Youmans campaigned energetically for the Dunkin Act in Port Hope, and Cobourg, and was also active in the Scott Act agitation a few years later. In 1883 she went to the old country as a delegate from the Canadian W. C. T. U., toured the Pacific coast in 1886, and in both places her reception was most cordial and the impressions she left very favorable.

In 1888 she was stricken with inflammatory rheumatism, and was a sufferer from that disease up till her death.

She was on intimate terms with Lady Henry Somerset and Frances Willard, and has for years been president of the W. C. T. U. of Ontario.

Referring to the deceased, Miss Willard wrote: "By her great gifts as a speaker, her remarkable energy and effective work, she did more than any other woman to make the W. C. T. U. a force in Canada. Clear and logical in her appeals, Mrs. Youmans was never so effective as on her devotional theme of 'home protection.' Her addresses, founded on the books of Esther and Nehemiah, are among the most forcibly appealing ever uttered for the prohibitory law."

The remains will be taken today to Pictou for burial on Wednesday.

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
