INQUEST ADJOURNED.

The inquest ordered yesterday by Dr. Piper, touching the death of the infant child of Lily Earl, was begun last night. The jury was composed as follows: Messrs. Charles Cowan (foreman), George W. Pitt, Wm. Chittick, Thomas Stephenson, Henry Wasbridge, George Wyatt, Robert Charlton, David Tappin, Wm. Johnston, John C. Gunn, James Jeffery, David Bauldrey, Samuel Hennessy, John Barons and William H. Brenton.

After the remains had been viewed at Clark & Smith's undertaking rooms, the jury repaired to the police court, and the taking of evidence was begun. Only three witnesses were heard, and the evidence was practically to the same effect as the story of the affair in yesterday's issue. The nurse who attended the girl after her admission to the hospital, the nurse who was called into the house and who discovered the body of the infant, and Dr. Kingsmill, who examined the girl and performed the post-mortem on the infant, all gave evidence. The post-mortem showed that death had been the result partially of hemorrhage and partly of suffocation. Adjourned till Wednesday, July 25, to allow of new evidence being secured.

The financial committee will deal with four applications for remission of taxes.

PLOTING AT JOHANNESBURG

Nearly 400 Vagrant Foreigners Arrested.

In Consequence of the Discovery of a Plot—10,000 Boers Massing Near Pretoria—Lord Roberts in Good Health.

Pretoria, July 17.—Three hundred and eighty vagrant foreigners have been arrested at Johannesburg in consequence of the discovery of a plot to create a riot and to join a Boer commando with which they have been in communication. The foreign consuls have been notified. The suspects will be liberated if they (the consuls) will answer for their future good behavior.

BOERS GATHERING NEAR PRETORIA.

New York, July 17.—A Herald dispatch from Pretoria, dated July 14, says the Boers continue massing from twenty miles outside the Magaliesburg range, near Pretoria. Their laagers now extend from the Delagoa Bay Railway across the Warsaw line westward. The enemy's total strength is probably about 10,000 men, with many guns. The inaction of the British main army has given the enemy confidence. The Boer raiders creep closer and do much sniping.

ROBERTS ALL RIGHT.

London, July 17.—Reports that Lord Roberts is seriously ill are absolutely unfounded. The veteran field marshal is in the best of health and spirits, cheery, youthful and vigorous.

BRITISH RECONNOISSANCE.

On Friday afternoon a reconnaissance was made in the direction of Wonderboom towards Onderstepoort, with a section of the Elswick battery. The men came under a sharp fire from the Boers, whose patrols were then fired on. The Boers used cannon, the shells coming close to the Elswick battery, but the long 12-pounder quick-firers did no damage. The Elswick guns were then unlimbered, and returned a fire of shrapnel, good. The shells checked the fusillade only partially. The force, having accomplished its object, retired to camp, the British big 6-inch gun in the fort dropping shells amid the Boers who ventured too near.

HOW COL. OTTER WAS WOUNDED.

London, July 17.—Members of the Royal Canadian Regiment of Infantry now in England, having been invalided here from South Africa, but who were present at the engagement near Bloemfontein, in which Col. Otter was wounded, say that their commanding officer, seeing that there was no other way to prevent his men advancing on the enemy's position, which it was impossible to take, rode in front of the regiment in order to get them to halt. Then he was wounded. Pte. Latimer, who was afterwards killed, rushed to Col. Otter's assistance, when the latter cried out: "Back, men; you will only draw the fire."

HOSPITAL ARRANGEMENTS.

Pte. J. F. McConnell, of the Governor-General's Guard, Ottawa, and a member of D.M.P., says that Mr. Burdett-Coutts, M.P., has good grounds for the statements he has made concerning the hospitals in South Africa.

ST. MARYS, Ont., July 17.—Pte. George J. Graham, of the first Canadian contingent, arrived home yesterday.

Immensely crowded at the G. T. R. station to greet him on his return. The cadet volunteer corps, headed by the town band, led the procession. At the town hall Mayor Lawrie presented him with a very flattering address. The modest young soldier made a brief reply. Little Gladys Butcher presented the veteran with a beautiful bouquet. After addresses by Col. H. A. White and others the procession and others escorted him to his father's residence.

Windsor, Ont., July 17.—Victor Marantette, the Windsor soldier, telegraphed his father yesterday morning that he would arrive at the C. P. R. depot in Windsor at 2 o'clock this afternoon. Representative citizens and members of the 21st Regiment will meet him at the depot, but the demonstration in honor of his homecoming will not take place until evening. Arrangements have been completed for a torchlight procession, at the head of which the 21st Regiment will march, and there will be a fireworks display. Marantette will ride in a carriage drawn by members of No. 3 company.

PTE. SUTTON.

Hamilton, Ont., July 17.—Joseph H. Sutton, a member of the 13th Battalion, who went to South Africa with the Canadian contingent, arrived home last night, invalided on account of wounds and fever. It was a rather sad home-coming for the brave soldier, his affianced wife having died during his absence.

A procession accompanied Sutton to the armory, where a reception of a more formal nature was tendered and the returned soldier, and he was congratulated on all hands. Sutton looks comparatively well, although he was ill for a long period of fever, and is still suffering from wounds received in the Paardeberg engagement.

J. W. Cartwright, of Smithville, another of the Canadians invalided home from South Africa, passed through Hamilton yesterday, and was met here by relatives from Smithville, and a number of the friends of Capt. C. N. Nelles, who was wounded in a skirmish near Pretoria last Saturday. He was relieved this morning when a cablegram was received in the city, saying that the wounded man was doing well. It was signed by Capt. Nelles himself, so that it is improbable that the injuries are other than as stated by the war office report, "slight."

Andrew Howell, of Harriston, pleaded guilty of bigamy.

Andrew McGowan, of Denbigh township, was killed by lightning.

Work on the provincial winter fair buildings at Guelph has begun.

The world's largest florist and rose-grower, Mr. H. Dale, died on Sunday at Brampton, Ont.

A dispatch from China states that Dr. Maggie S. Wallace, formerly of Es- Es- Es, and now in China, is safe at Che Foo.

William R. Smith, of Hespeler, fell off a scaffold, a distance of 20 feet, and received injuries that may prove fatal.

John Delmage, of Niagara Falls, N. Y., jumped from the new G. T. R. bridge into the rapids and was not seen again.

A. C. Wartele, brother of Justice Wartele, and a director of the defunct Ville Marie Bank, died on Monday at Montreal.

Hon. Mr. Tarte, Canadian commissioner at the Paris Exposition, sails from Liverpool on the Lake Champlain on July 24.

Louis Eisen, a Baltimore shoemaker, on Sunday killed his wife, a 13-month-old babe and himself, besides wounding his 12-year-old son.

The St. Thomas Street Railway has been losing money at the rate of \$2,000 a year and the directors want to hand it over to the city.

While the others of her family were at church Sunday Flora Henderson, a young woman, aged about 45, cut her throat with a potato knife.

The British steamer Langton Grange cleared on Monday from New Orleans, for Cape Town, South Africa, with 830 horses for the British army.

Peter Hawley, who lived on the north shore of Lake Huron, near Hastings, was killed by a falling tree while shoveling his boat off the shore.

Wm. Barnie, manager of the Hartford, Conn., baseball team, and well known throughout the country, died at Hartford on Sunday, aged 46.

The funeral of the late Dr. Mowat took place at Cataract Cemetery, in Kingston. In obedience to his doctor's advice, Sir Oliver Mowat did not attend.

Recent events have worked to vindicate Gen. Lawton's judgment that the Boer troops would be needed to establish an American sovereignty over the Philippines.

Sir Louis Davies, Hon. Mr. Blair and Hon. Mr. Fielding intend taking a month's rest, and will sail for England by the New England of the Dominion Line on Wednesday next.

Miss Croll, from Ramsay's Corners, went to Ottawa on July 12 to attend the celebration. It is known that she got on the train to return to the corners in the evening, but since then no trace has been found of her.

There were many prostrations from heat in Chicago on Sunday. The Church of the Mystic Three on Wentworth avenue was partly demolished by the wind. Five hundred persons in the building were panic-stricken, and in the rush to escape several were severely injured.

Three men from Canada had a narrow escape from drowning Sunday, while in a catboat off Ecorse, Mich. The boat capsized in a squall and the men clinging to the bottom until rescued by Gus Cramer, the Ecorse lighthouse keeper. One of the men was named Busha and another Meloch.

The tragedy in East Seneca township, reported on Monday, resulted in the death of Mrs. Swick, mother of the murdered woman, on hearing of the terrible tragedy, died from the shock. Her son, Mr. A. Swick, and brother of the murdered woman, is lower man for the M. C. R. at Canfield Junction. The proper name of the murderer and suicide is Smuck.

John Grant, night watchman for the

Toronto Ferry Company, was making his rounds early this (Tuesday) morning, when he noticed two men attempting to get into Durnan's pavilion, at the island. He intervened, but the burglars grasped him, bound him with strong cords, and struck him a blow with a chisel that may prove fatal. John Grant is the father of Sergt. Grant, at present in service with the Canadian contingent in South Africa.

What looks like a deliberate case of suicide is reported by Maitland Ackroyd, a boat hirer, at Toronto. Shortly before noon on Sunday a young man hired a rowboat and secured a heavy weight with it, saying he wanted to anchor the boat in that way while watching the boat races. Less than half an hour afterwards the boat was found drifting in the middle of the bay with the oars and cushions all right, but without either the weight or the young man. Rupert G. Lovell, a young student, who is missing, answers to the description of the drowned man.

Western Ontario.

Knox Church, Woodstock, was struck by lightning on Sunday and slightly damaged.

Mrs. Martha Van Allen Blackadder, wife of J. W. Blackadder, a resident of Windsor for over 60 years, is dead. Mrs. Blackadder was born at Howard's Bridge, near Chatham.

The eyesight of R. N. Price, head miller at the Erie mills, fell out of a survey while returning home from Fingal. He struck his back against one of the steps and was severely injured.

"Punch" Mason, under arrest in Boston, is wanted at Sarnia, where, with some accomplice, he worked a gold brick game, by which J. D. Moore, a wealthy commission merchant of St. Marys, Ont., was swindled out of \$3,000. Moore will not be extradited unless Moore stands the expense.

Roy Woollen, the 7-year-old son of Samuel Woollen, M. C. R. brakeman, of St. Thomas, was running along the street Monday, and in some manner got his right leg caught in the entire of a wheel, and was killed.
