Live Items Called for Busy People's Information.

Mrs. S. J. Ball, 57 years old, died on Sunday at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. William Stokes, of London street east, Windsor.

The promoters of the Windsor, Essex and Lake Shore Railway declare they will not accept a franchise on the terms proposed by the railway committee of the Windsor council.

A pleasant event took place at Berlin Tuesday afternoon, at the hospital there, when Miss Duncan, who retires from the superintendency, was presented with an address and a check for \$100. In the Essex assize court on Saturday judgment was given for the plaintiff in the case of Fenton vs. Struth. The defendant was ordered to pay a balance of \$200 due on a note given in part payment of a tobacco factory in Leamington, and the counter-claim for damages for misrepresentation was dismissed.

Magistrate Bartlett, at Windsor, dismissed the charge against Peter Martin of stealing a race horse from Sol White. Martin claims he has kept the horse as security for wages due him by White. The horse will remain in Martin's custody, and White will be compelled to begin civil action if he wishes to recover it.

Windsor Record: Walkerville is not much of a marriage center, but when marriages do take place they are out of the ordinary sort. On April 8 the marriage took place at the residence of Theodore Holmes of Thomas T. Fitzsimmons, aged 65 years, of Middlesex county, and Mrs. Elizabeth Thompson, aged 59 years, of Walkerville, Ontario. The couple were married by Rev. Mr. Holmes, of Leamington.

Ottawa, Ont., April 15.—Francis A. Graham, blacksmith, 42 years old, was fatally injured yesterday by being struck by a Canada Atlantic train while walking on the track in Ottawa East. All his limbs were broken and he died at the hospital.

BOTH SHOT DEAD!

Cleveland Woman and Her Daughter Murdered—Stepson Suspected.

Cleveland, Ohio, April 14.—Mrs. Martha J. Calhoun, aged 75, and her daughter, Mrs. Vaughn, aged 46, were shot and killed yesterday by an unknown person, two miles east of Mahoning Station, 40 miles southeast of this city. Will Vaughn, a stepson of the younger woman, is locked up in Ravenna jail, charged with the crimes. Mrs. Vaughn was shot five times in the back, the sixth shot a revolver ending the life of her mother. Vaughn's father died a few days ago, and it is believed he left the bulk of his estate to the two women. Blood was found on his clothing.

IRONWORKERS DISCUSS THE WAGES QUESTION

Amalgamated Association in Session at Wheeling, W. Va.

Wheeling, W. Va., April 15.—The opening session of the Amalgamated Association convention was called to order this morning by President Theodore Shaffer, with over 200 delegates in attendance. The address of welcome delivered by Mayor A. T. Sweeney was responded to by President Shaffer and Assistant Secretary Tight. The convention then went into executive session, and consideration of the credentials was taken up.

The wage committee is still in session. It is believed that the committee will report favorably on the recent agreements entered into with the American Iron Plate, American Sheet Steel, American Steel Hoop and Rebar, and Iron and Steel Company, and that the convention will ratify what has been done. With much interest in the presidency, Shaffer is a candidate for reelection. Between Secretary M. F. Tighe is being boomed by his admirers. No other candidates are mentioned at this time.

THE C. P. R. TRACKMEN.

Montreal, April 15.—The C. P. R. and its trackmen have decided to arbitrate their differences, and P. Gutelius, of the C. P. R. engineering department, and Mr. Wilson, president of the Trackmen's Union, had a meeting this morning to appoint a third arbitrator, but no decision in that connection was made. It is the intention to have a complete investigation of the whole matter of the trackmen's claims. The officials of the C. P. R. say the opening of lake navigation will help greatly in the work of clearing the grain block.

It is estimated there are yet 20,000,000 bushels of grain awaiting transportation, of which 13,000,000 bushels are on the line of the C. P. R.

NOTES.

Railroads out of Chicago have voluntarily increased the wages of freight-handlers. The advance varies in the different districts. Between the total increase is \$25,000 per month, and affects 8,000 men.

The electrical workers employed by the two large electrical companies in Montreal, the Montreal Light, Heat and Power Company, and the Machine Rapids Hydraulic and Land Company, numbering about 700 men, will go on strike in a few days, unless they get a uniform rate of wages. There is also a possibility of a strike of the building trades workers, who were betwixt wages between 4,000 and 5,000 men are concerned.

As a result of the conference, it is generally felt that within a few days the strike of the bituminous miners in Pennsylvania will be declared off.

All these mines of the Anaconda, Parrot and Washoe companies, in Montana, which were closed by the holding miners' strike, have resumed operations with about half the force of miners and new engineers.
