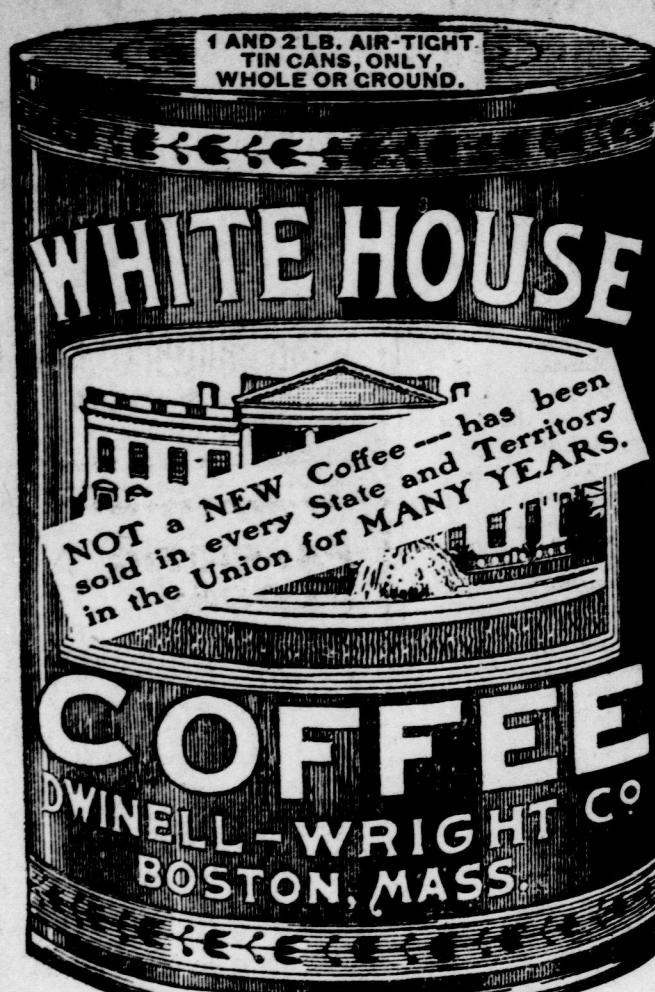

GARDNER HAS SEEN BEST DAYS

Lowell Man Cannot Hit as of Yore—Affair Without a Dangerous Blow.

George Gardner, of Lowell, Mass., ex-champion light heavyweight, had his hands full when he undertook to defeat John Wille in Chicago, and considering himself fortunate in that he received an even break in the decision of the referee.

The Chicagoan entered the ring 18 pounds over weight, while Gardner weighed in at the stipulated notch, which was 165 pounds, and handicapped by the great weight of his heavier opponent, Gardner was almost helpless in the hauling and wrestling which resulted whenever Wille rushed.

Wille attempted to wear down Gardner with sheer brute force, and in the first three rounds the object of his bull-rushes was nearly attained. The laster was tired from his own exertions in struggling with his stocky adversary, and had it not been for a Haverhill white the last lap was being made, yesterday morning, resulted in the motor stopping; but owing to the depression that had been made, 165 miles had been covered at that time.

Mr. Picard set out from New York for the second trip at 12:25 o'clock on Tuesday morning. He arrived at Boston at 4:25 o'clock on Tuesday afternoon, and Mr. La Roche left there at 5:05 o'clock, the engine never having been stopped. The finish was made at 10:05 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon.

On the last lap from Boston to New York, Mr. La Roche went away at Hartford and drove 35 miles out of his way by going to Unionville and back.

THE RHODY TOOK THE LIPTON CUP

Little Yachts Finished in Long Parade After Daring Race of 330 Miles.

Marble Head, Mass., July 5.—Of the nine little 35-foot yachts that started out so bravely last Saturday forenoon from Gravesend Bay, New York, five were anchored at sunset, tonight in Marble Head Harbor after a daring race of 330 miles. The Little Rhody crossed the finish line at 9:48 last night winning the 100 guinea cup offered by Sir Thomas Lipton. The Newashi was second, two hours and 52 minutes behind. The Ray II. was third, 4 hours and 20 minutes astern of the leader, while the Fanshawe was fourth and the Mignon fifth, the two latter boats being 12 hours and 36 minutes behind the Rhode Island yacht. Tonight it was learned that the Seabird, owned and sailed by Thomas Fleming Day, the originator of the race, was coming across Massachusetts Bay. The summary of the race as far as finished tonight is as follows: Little Rhody elapsed time, 58 hours and 48 minutes; corrected time, 55 hours and 48 minutes; Newashi, elapsed time, 60 hours and 40 minutes; corrected time, 58 hours and 40 minutes; Ray II., elapsed time, 63 hours and 30 minutes; corrected time, 62 hours and 30 minutes; Fanshawe, elapsed time, 21 hours, 24 minutes; corrected time, 69 hours and 40 minutes; Mignon, elapsed time, 72 hours and 30 minutes; corrected time, 70 hours and 22 minutes.

THOUSAND MILES WITHOUT A STOP

Auto Record for America Established by New Yorkers—Went Day and Night.

New York, July 6.—F. A. La Roche, of this city, has succeeded in completing the first automobile run of 1,000 miles without the engine stopping ever made in this country. The feat was first performed in England by S. F. Edge.

Mr. La Roche used the course from New York to Boston and back, making two round trips over it. He was aided in the feat by A. J. Picard, and the work of driving the car was divided between them, one man traveling between the cities by rail, and the other driving the car.

The distance covered in all was 1,135 miles and the total time occupied was 67 hours and 20 minutes. The extra distance was involved because of two mistakes in taking the wrong road, and it was peculiarly fortunate that this happened.

It would have been a thousand miles covered without the motor stopping. An accident that happened near New York at 4:25 o'clock on Tuesday afternoon, yesterday morning, resulted in the motor stopping; but owing to the depression that had been made, 165 miles had been covered at that time.

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SWARM OF BEES CAUSE A PANIC

Ball Game Interrupted by Stingers, Which Stung Over 100 Spectators.

Des Moines, Iowa, July 6.—A panic that came near resulting in loss of life was precipitated at the ball park Monday afternoon by a swarm of bees settling down in the midst of a throng of 1,000 persons who occupied the bleachers. No less than 100 persons were stung, some of them very seriously. Their cries of pain and terror caused a wild stampede. During the stampede three women fainted and several persons sustained slight injuries in the crush at the exits. The game, which was between St. Joseph and Des Moines, was called until the bees were driven off. The crowd was induced to return to the bleachers, but kept as far from the spot where the owner was had led her swarm as possible.

She selected a Panama hat on which to settle, and strangely enough the owner was unharmed. The bees were sold for \$10.

DURNAN AND SULLIVAN TO RACE AT TORONTO

Henley-on-Thames, July 5.—Wens, speaking to the Canadian Associated Press, said Scholes had no trouble in beating Kelly and Mount from the umpire's boat.

BOOKMAKERS' WORK GAME.

To prevent any possibility of a raid on the Hawthorne race track yesterday afternoon by Sheriff Barrett, the 41 bookmakers indicted by the grand jury for accepting wagers on the races at Hawthorne surrendered themselves to the sheriff's office today and gave bonds of \$1,000 each for their appearance when wanted for trial. After their bond had been paid, indicted bookmakers left for Hawthorne, where they accepted bets yesterday afternoon without molestation. While Sheriff Singleton, of the Citizens' Association, the organization that secured the indictments against the bookmakers, had nothing to say today about the future movements of the association in combating race track betting, it is expected the organization will act against Hawthorne, which opens its summer meeting tomorrow.

TORE DOWN UNION JACK

United States Soldiers Had a Hand in the Affair.

New York, July 5.—Whitstone, in the borough of Queens, has not yet come to that state of mind where it can contentedly see the British flag floating on the 4th of July. A hand-some woman was thrown to the ground yesterday morning by John Armstrong, an old Scotchman, who has lived in this country many years, but only five weeks at Whitstone. The owner asserts he intended no offense, and that he had done the same thing for years in New York City, but the flag was taken down by five soldiers from Fort Totten.

William T. Butler, former secretary to Controller Bird S. Coier, saw the flag started yesterday morning in the village. He heard talk which caused him to go to Armstrong and ask him to remove the flag or hang out an American flag above or alongside it. Armstrong had no American flag, and declined Butler's offer to provide one.

Several movements to take down the flag were started, but nothing was accomplished until artillerymen reached the station on their way to Manhattan for an outing. They were Sergeant Charles E. Montgomery, Corporal William Moseley and Privates Brown, Clark and Winslow. They asked that the flag be taken down. Armstrong refused. Sergeant Montgomery ordered Private Clark upon the veranda, and he shinned to the roof and removed the flag.

It was carried to the rear of the house where Armstrong was and was offered to him. He refused to touch it, on the ground that it had been defiled.

It was placed on the ground, and remained there.

Armstrong says the soldiers acted in a boisterous and disorderly manner.

REALIZATION WORTH \$21,000, TO ORT WELLS

New York, July 5.—Ort Wells, winner of the Commonwealth Handicap, today added another stake to his list by capturing the rich Lawrence Realization stakes of \$21,000 to the winner at Sheepshead Bay. He won handily by one length. Mercury finished second, with Grazia III. third. The 2:47 5-8 is 2-5-5 seconds slower than Africander's time, made last year in this event. There was a short delay at the post, Ort Wells was first to show, with Mercury second and St. Valentine third. O'Neill on Ort Wells pulled back and lay in third place, passing the stand the first time. St. Valentine was leading and Ostrich second. Making the paddock turn St. Valentine was still leading. In the run down the back stretch Odom brought Ostrich up to the lead. O'Neill also moved up, rounding the far turn the positions remained unchanged. Three-eighths of a mile from home Ostrich dropped back and lay in third place, passing the stand the first time. St. Valentine was leading and Ostrich second. 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
