


Duty on Power

Ottawa. Jan. 5.—In the interest of Canadian consumers of elecicity the Dominion Government nave decided upon a most important policy. It is no less than obtaining authority from Parliament to impose an export duty upon electrical energy, and to forbid any company from exporting power without a license, to be granted in accordance with regulations to be prescribed by the governor-in-council. The object of the proposed legislation is to insure to Canadian consumers all the power they require at reasonable prices It will be provided that a company which complies with the regulations which the Government will lay down may be relieved from the payment of the export duty.

The only year in over a decade that recorded smaller liabilities than 1906 was 1903, and the number of failures was below all previous years since 1882 except two. In view of the steady growth of business in the Dominion of Canada these statistics indicate a low death rate almost as gratifying as that shown by United States.
