300 NEWSPAPER MEN OUT

Greatest Crowds That Ever Packed a Ball Yard Are Expected This Year.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Oct. 7.—Three hundred skilled baseball writers and artists will be called upon to appease the appetite of thousands for news of the national league series which commences here next Saturday between the Giants and the Athletics.

From all parts of America baseball writers have applied for seats at the games here and in Philadelphia, and the national commission has set aside a section of the grandstand for reporters. Scores of newspaper wires will be used to transmit the progress of the contests, play by play.

Resides the regular corps of baseball writers several prominent baseball players have been engaged to report the games. Their accounts of the day's game written and filed, the newspapermen will entrain for the next scene of battle. Last year, the correspondents traveled between Philadelphia and Chicago on a special train, with the national commission and players, but the proximity of the two contesting cities this year makes the jumps easier.

MAJOR LEAGUE SEASONS WILL CLOSE EARLIER

Ban Johnson Says Magnates Are Convinced of Folly of Operating in Wintry Weather.

[Canadian Press.] Chicago, Ill., Oct. 7.—There will be no more late finishes in the major league seasons, according to B. B. Johnson, president of the American League, who returned from New York yesterday.

Likewise the playing of the world's series battles will hereafter be commenced fully a week in advance. The dates now selected for the pending title clashes.

This will also mean that both major league seasons will be closed simultaneously and not on different dates, as is the case this year, the American ringing down the curtain tomorrow, and the National League delaying the final until Oct. 12.

It is said early closing will not necessitate the advancement of the opening in the spring. It will simply be a case of eliminating a number of open dates.

CAPONI WALLOPED BY SAM LANGFORD

Referee Stops Bout After Three Rounds of Battering.

New York, Oct. 6.—Sam Langford, the Nova Scotia "tar baby," used Toby Caponi, a Chicago heavyweight, as a model for slugging purposes in a scheduled ten-round bout at the Twentieth Century A. C. tonight. Referee Charley White had to stop the fight in the third round, as Caponi was helpless from the beating the big colored fighter had given him. Langford played with his opponent for the first round, and in the second he knocked Caponi down for the count of nine by a shift of the left foot from stomach to jaw, followed by a right to the jaw. The Chicago boy went down for the second time in this round for six seconds, and in the third Langford knocked him all over the ring. It was a left to the jaw that practically knocked him out.

CLARENCE DE MAR WINS.

Boston, Mass., Oct. 6.—Clarence De Mar, 22 years old, of Melrose, Mass., won the Boston Fair Marathon run today, covering the 23½ miles in 2 hours, 29 minutes and 55.4 seconds.

One hundred thousand people saw the race along the route, and 10,000 more cheered the winner at the finish. De Mar finished fresh and walked with steady step to the grandstand, where Governor Foss presented him with the big silver cup. De Mar won the last Boston Marathon, breaking all previous records for the 25-mile course, beating by over two minutes the record which was made by Tom Longboat, the Canadian Indian, in 1907.

CONVICT'S TUNNEL FOR THREE YEARS

Search After Discovery Reveals Many Hidden Knives and Other Weapons.

Dannemora, N. Y., Oct. 7.—The officials of the states prison here have just discovered a tunnel excavated by convicts under the prison yard, and reaching half-way to a big trunk sewer, which would have afforded a convenient exit for a wholesale jail delivery.

The tunnel has been three years under construction, and was still not more than half done. It was started by two life-term men. They could not make rapid progress because of the difficulty of disposing of the dirt which they had to mix in small quantities with furnace ashes from the laundry. One of the two was an engineer, and he had worked out by intricate calculations the exact angle at which the tunnel should be dropped to reach the sewer.

After the tunnel was found a search was made of every convict in the prison. From the cells were taken two wagonloads of nondescript stuff, including stiletos, hammers, monkey wrenches, sandbags, blackjacks, fish poles, and 350 knives.
