Quebec, Aug. 20.—That wolves and bears are increasing in numbers in Northern Quebec, and notably in the National Park, where wild animals are protected by law, and that in some places they are becoming a menace to the safety of the settlers and their domestic animals, is indicated by a petition received by Dr. Deschenes, deputy minister of Crown lands, from the townships of Mesy and Caron, in the Lake St. John district.

HOW "HONEST JOHN" GLINNAN ACCEPTED THE BIG BRIBE

Detective of Burns' Staff Testified in the Detroit Graft Inquiry How He Trapped Eighteen Aldermen—Induced Glinnan to Engineer Scheme.

Detroit, Aug. 20.—The testimony of W. J. Brennan, a Burns operative, was made today of "Honest John" Glinnan, the first of the eighteen aldermen recently arrested on bribery charges to be tried in court. It was Brennan's evidence that resulted in the arrests of the eighteen aldermen and Common Council Clerk Edward Schreiter, the latter since having made a complete confession. Today Brennan went into all details of the trapping of the aldermen up to the time he alleges that he, representing himself to be an official of the Wabash Railroad, paid Glinnan \$1,000 for his influence in granting to railroads their request for the use of a city street for building purposes.

Glinnan Came to Him. Brennan, upon taking the stand, explained that his right name is Walter J. Burns and that his home is in Boston. He told of coming to the city in April and taking offices in the Ford building as a representative of the Wabash Railroad. He also engaged an Adjunct office and had "New England Historical Society" printed on its door. The detective then told of getting himself acquainted with the different aldermen and impressing upon them the urgent desire of the railroad for the rights to the street and of opposition to the proposal that was expressed by several of the councilmen. Finally, he testified, Glinnan came to his office and arrangements were made for the closing of the street.

"Glinnan told me at that time that he wanted to use me as a pipe line to St. Louis," said witness Brennan. "He had wanted for years to get on the Wabash Railroad, he said, and thought he could serve the company by looking after its taxes and other matters in the city hall. He said he would want about \$100 a month for his service."

"I interrupted to say, 'Aldermen, this street-closing case has been referred back to the committee, and I guess there is some difficulty,' isn't it?" "Yes, but I guess we can adjust it," he replied.
