Says American Press Exulted When France Was To Use Gases.

[Canadian Press.] New York, April 27.—Dr. Bernhard Dernburg, former colonial secretary of the German empire, issued a statement today relating to the use of asphyxiating gases by the Germans in trench warfare. Dr. Dernburg asserted that when there were published last November reports of a French invention for the purpose of asphyxiating enemies by nauseating gases, the ending of the war in favor of the Allies, was predicted "with a great deal of satisfaction" by the American press.
