TEUTONS IN TIGHT FIX

Herald from London says: Most alarming of all the news recent-ly published in Germany is the report, received through Stockholm, that Grand Duke Nicholas had left Trebizond for Odessa to proceed to Kieff and thence to go to the Dobrudja to take command f the armies driving south through Bulgaria toward Constantinopie.

Huge Russian Army. Reports from many quarters affirm that these armies have been organized on a very large scale, and the German reading public is being prepared for coming events and the announcement that this campaign for the conquest of Rumania and the rolling up of the Russian left, Field Marshal von Hindenburg and von Mackensen-to whom, it s recalled, is due the fact that the Prussian army is still camping in Russia, that Serbia is in the hands of the central allies, that Bulgaria is carrying out unimpeded military operations on large scale, and that Turkey has lost none of her confidence-will probably have to manoeuvre extensively on acnt of the pecaliar terrain of the Dobrudja. The vast quadrilateral of the Dobrudja lying between the elbow of the Danube, the Black Sea and the Rumanian-Bulgarian frontier on the south, is an immense sandy plain with marshes on the edge of the river and of the seashore. THE DIARY OF MARS

On the Somme front Paris claims further progress in the vicinity of the Peronne-Bapaume road, the French advance being effected in the vicinity of Morval, to the west of the road. The capture of nine 31/2-inch German guns is also re-ported. London's official statement speaks only of artillery and raiding operations in the Somme region.

On the western end of the Macedonlan front the Serbians pressing northward towards Monastir, fighting on Serbian soil to the southeast and close to the border further westward. In this rethey have reached the town of Buf, twelve miles below Monastir. according to Paris today, while around behind the bend of the Cerna Lipa they are still nearer their objective. According to the Sofia announce ment, the invasion of Bulgaria by Rumanian troops who crossed the Danube near Rahovo, in the rear of the main battle line in Dobrudja has ended disastrously for Invaders, their force being scat-

To combat the Rumanians, who apparently were from 12,000 to 16,-000 strong but declared to be with-out artillery, the Bulgarians sent troops from Rustchuk and Turtukal, on either side of the point of crossing. Caught between two forces, the Rumanians are said to have made for their pontoon bridge, which they found destroyed by Austrian monitors.

Reporting operations along the Dobrudja front south of the Tcher-navoda Constanza railway the Sofia official announcement reports the repulse of all the Russian and Rumanian attempts to advance. Bucharest has claimed substantial progres with these attacks near the centre and towards the Black Sea coast and yesterday reported the capture of more than 1,000 prisoners and 7 guns from Field Marshal von Mackensen's forces.
