Russia's Food Production Is Decreasing

OTTAWA, Nov. 14.—The food production in Russia has fallen to about one-half of the total production previous to the war, according to a statement made by L. D. Wilgress, Canadian trade commissioner, in the weekly bulletin department of trade and commerce, who has just returned to London from a visit to Moscow, Petrograd and the famine belt at Kazan. Industrial production, says Mr. Wilgress, is now only one-tenth what it was in 1913.

The total production of rye in Russia before the war amounted to 79,500,000 tons, while in 1920 the crop amounted to 40,000,000. The immediate cause of the famine is the long drought of the




