DOMINION TRADE GAIN

IS SHOWN IN REPORT
Increase of \$216,000,000 Total Reported Over Eleven Months.

Ottawa, March 16.—The total trade of the Dominion for the 11 months of the current fiscal year shows an increase of \$216,000,000 above the figures for the corresponding period last year. The report of foreign merchandise remains practically the same, and of the increase \$174,000,000 is in domestic exports and \$42,000,000 in imports.

The increase in exports is pretty well spread over the entire list, though the most noticeable growths are \$86,000,000 largely in foods, \$42,000,000 in wood and its products, \$20,000,000 in iron and \$14,000,000 in non-ferrous metals. Among the imports the chief increases are \$29,000,000 in three and textiles and \$24,000,000 in iron and its products.

There are several decreases in imports, the largest being one of nearly \$5,000,000 in the food group.

For February, the last month reported, the betterment in the total trade is \$22,000,000, divided about equally between imports and exports.

HOUSE TO ADJOURN.

NIXON SILENCES
CRITICISM AIMED
AT INSTITUTIONS

Provincial Secretary Offers To Resign If Alleged Irregularities Are Correct.

MAKES CHALLENGE

Asks Toronto Member To Give Up Seat If Charges Are Not Warranted.

Toronto, March 16.—During an exhaustive resume of every branch of public institutions—hospitals, reformatories, homes, prison farms, etc.—in the Legislature last night, Provincial Secretary Nixon indignantly denied the accuracy of form of criticisms of J. E. Thompson, Conservative member for Northeast Toronto, as to the uncleanliness and general undesirable atmosphere about provincial charitable and reform institutions.

His direct challenge to the Toronto member was that a committee be appointed to visit these institutions in the province, and their collective opinion secured as to conditions. If they found these institutions as Mr. Thompson had said, Hon. Mr. Nixon said he would resign his seat and not seek political honors again. On the other hand the member for Northeast Toronto must bind himself to the same conditions, and having regard to their respective positions in the House, and their prospects for the future, Hon. Mr. Nixon thought he was offering odds of 5 to 1.

GIVES DETAILED REPORT.

In his address, which lasted a portion of the afternoon and the greater part of the evening, the provincial secretary gave the House detailed information and a host of statistics upon every activity connected with his department. He was unable to show considerable progress all along the line, and emphasized the fact that in some departments the operating costs of public institutions had declined in the aggregate, although the number of inmates had increased.

Regarding social legislation, with which his department is particularly concerned, Hon. Mr. Nixon stated that the Drury government had done more in the direction of improving social conditions by legislation than had been done during any considerable period prior to the coming into office of this government.

RECEIVES CHALLENGE.

Challenged by H. H. Dewar, K.C. (Liberal, Southwest Toronto) to bring on his program for the care of the feeble-minded, the minister said that provision had been made in the estimates and that the department would go forward cautiously, making the best of the machinery available.

The minister gave information concerning the growth of hospitals in the province as a result of the government's decision a session or two ago to increase the grants. As a result smaller communities found themselves able to construct much needed institutions, and among those who had since decided upon hospital construction were: Englehart, Dryden, Hearst, Emo, Paris, Listowel, Matheson, Cobell, Kitchener, Ottawa, and St. Joseph's of Toronto.

VISIT OF KING GEORGE
TO POPE IS OPPOSED

Manitoba Grand Lodge Brands Proposed Call On Vatican As Outrage.

Winnipeg, March 16.—Deeming that His Majesty King George has been ill advised if he seriously intends to visit His Holiness the Pope while on his visit to Italy, and protesting against any "such unconstitutional action," the fifty-first annual session of the Grand Orange Lodge of Manitoba, meeting yesterday, unanimously passed a resolution opposing any such meeting, which will be forwarded to the secretary of state for foreign affairs. Every grand lodge in the world has been circularized by City of London Lodge, No. 45, to prevent what it terms "an outrage against the Protestant legislation and liberties of the English-speaking nation."

"Under the bill of rights," says the resolution passed this morning, "our crown is banned from holding any communion with the See or Church of Rome, and these are not the days in which constitutional safeguards ought to be flouted. Moreover, we must earnestly, unanimously add our voice to the request that already has been made to his majesty's government that the British mission to the Vatican be withdrawn."

WILL LIKELY RESUME
PEACE NEGOTIATIONS

Allied Representatives To Consider Turk Counter-Proposals Next Week.

London, March 16.—It is generally believed that the Near Eastern peace negotiations recently broken off at Lausanne after weeks of wrangling between the Allies and the Turks are about to be resumed. The British foreign office Thursday announced that British, French and Italian representatives would meet here next week to consider the counter-proposals of the Turks, which have just been handed to the Entente.

The delegates of the Entente will decide whether the issues raised in the Turkish communication can legitimately be grouped under questions left open at Lausanne.
