

CAUSE OF SERVICE LAMP FIRE AND LOSS OF \$15,000 UNKNOWN

Firemen Prevent Spread of Early Morning Blaze to Apartments,
Wray Factory and Martyn's Garage
on Talbot Street.

Investigation into the cause of fire which swept the plant of the Service Lamp Company, 218 Talbot street, at an early hour this morning, was started today by Fire Chief John Aitken.

The building, a three-story brick structure, occupied by James Twitchee, four and feed merchant on the part floor, and the Service Lamp Company on the second, was badly gutted. The loss is approximated by Fire Chief Aitken at \$15,000.

It was not until the flames had swept the interior and windows broke through the intense heat that a passing policeman attracted by the noise, turned in an alarm to the fire department at 2:35 o'clock this morning. It was little time before the building was lost with flames spreading through every room.

Firemen practically confined their efforts to preventing spread of the blaze to the neighboring buildings of the Massey Harris Company, boarding houses and apartments to the south, the Wray Overall Company and Martyn's garage in the rear.

Cause a Mystery.

Chief Aitken was unable to trace the origin of the fire when the flames were subdued sufficiently to permit entrance to the building at 5 o'clock this morning. The cause will probably never be known, he stated today, owing to the great headway the fire made before arrival of the fire department and the consequent internal damage.

Firemen worked from the roof of the sheetmetal works of Fleming & Houghton, south of the lamp works. More than a dozen lines of hose were laid. Members of the department climbed the fire escape at the rear of the burning building and worked there under difficulty.

From the nearby boarding houses and apartments, men and women, hastily dressed, ran to the street. Some commenced to remove furniture in anticipation of spread of the fire, but Chief Aitken's assurance at 3:30 o'clock that the fire was under control dissipated their alarm.

The loss will be covered by insurance, according to Chief Aitken.

FEWER CITIZENS APPLY FOR RELIEF

Inspector Sanders Finds Farm
Work Unpopular With
Men Seeking Aid.

Citizens applying for relief are not as numerous this fall as they were last year, Richard Sanders of the city relief department stated today.

"A peculiar thing in connection with relief work at the present time is the fact that those applying are mostly young men between 20 and 35 years of age," said Mr. Sanders. "They all have families of at least 3 or 4 children."

"Two men who called on me recently asking for help were sent to the office of John Farrell. They told me they would work at anything, even farm work, so I sent them to Mr. Farrell."

"I got a report from him stating that he had offered these men \$25 a month and board on the farm, but they had refused. Presumably sending them to the immigration officer, I told them that if they got jobs in the country, the city would help to keep their families here. However, they apparently wouldn't do that, and they haven't been back to see me since that time."

Mr. Sanders then told of a pathetic case brought to his attention today. A young married woman with five children had been deserted by her husband, and the little bit of money she had was now exhausted.

"She has every confidence that he hasn't left her for good, and some day will come back and send her some money. She even thinks that he may have met with an accident, and is positive that he wouldn't abandon his family. She asked me to mention her case to the paper in the hope that her husband would see the story and return to her. I hope he does, but I have my doubts. In the meantime we are trying to get her work and help keep the home intact."

Mayor Wenlock also knows of a woman who is a good worker and desirous of employment by the household cleaning, etc. A telephone call to the mayor's office will bring further information to citizens who have such work in their homes for a needy woman who is about to be put on the street if the rent is not paid.

MEDAL WINNERS ARE ANNOUNCED

Collegiate Pupils To Be Rewarded For Proficiency in
Many Subjects.

PRESENTED TONIGHT

Wossa Debaters Also To Hold
First Tilt at South
Collegiate.

A very important function in the school year of the South London Collegiate Institute will take place this evening in the Victoria public school auditorium, under the joint auspices of the Collegiate Parents' association and the Collegiate Institute Literary society. The important features of the meeting are: The first debate of the W. O. S. S. A. debating series and the presentation of medals won in the June examinations of 1925.

At present the W. O. S. S. A. debating series is held by the South London Collegiate Institute, having been won in the 1924-25 debating series, along with the four championship gold medals won by Arthur Hill, Archie Knapp, Leslie Pickles and Allan Riddell. This year, although none of these boys is available, the L. S. C. I. hopes to maintain its splendid reputation in this field of activity.

Strathroy boys, Cameron Corrigan and Ernest Wright, will uphold the affirmative of the subject, "Resolved, that the Dominion government should place an embargo on the export of wood." The negative will be taken up by Frank Mallory and Fraser Rowland of the South London Collegiate Institute. The judges for this debate will be Mr. Cuddy of Strathroy, Mr. J. G. E. Eachus of the London normal school, and Mr. A. R. Walker of the University of Western Ontario.

Through the athletic assistance of the South London Collegiate Parents' association and the generosity of a group of interested citizens, a splendid list of medals is available each year for the encouragement and recognition of good scholarship. There is no doubt that the awarding of these medals has had considerable influence in the high average standing of the school this year, and it is hoped that in this field the school may be able to maintain its splendid reputation also. All through it was but the first year for upper school work to be handled in the south collegiate institute, last year's class established a record of winning the award of the emulations of the others.

Arthur Hill won a Western university general proficiency scholarship for English, mathematics, history, languages and science, valued at \$200, ranking also for five others, which he could not be awarded, owing to his having obtained the highest award. Frances Stone won a special tuition scholarship valued at \$100, ranking also for two others, and Archie Knapp won the scholarship for highest standing in French, valued at \$75.

It has also recently been announced that Arthur Hill won the second Carter scholarship for Middlesex county, valued at \$50, the first central collegiate institute. The gold medal presented by Mr. G. F. Copeland for highest standing in upper school English goes to Edith Sutcliffe, while the gold medal presented by Mr. A. R. Ford for second highest standing in upper school English goes to Frances Stone. The gold medal for highest standing in French goes to Mr. J. G. Orchard for fourth-year general proficiency goes to Beatrice Cook.

The gold medal presented by Mr. C. B. R. for third-year general proficiency goes to Annie Ormond. The gold medal presented by Mr. Rowland Hill for second-year general proficiency goes to Genevieve Smith. The gold medal presented by Mr. Edgar Jeffery for first-year general proficiency goes to Walter Blakeley. The gold medal presented by Mr. E. R. Dennis for lower school art goes to Marion Brown. The gold medal presented by Mr. Howard Harry for highest standing in lower school biology goes to Vernon Funks. The gold medal presented by Mr. A. R. Cairncross for the greatest improvement in second year over first year, goes to Norman Cameron.

At 1 o'clock in the afternoon the doors of the abbey were again opened and a long procession began of those of the general public who wished to pay tribute to the dead queen for the last time. The coffin of the queen after lying in the abbey all night tonight will be carried to Windsor for burial in the private royal chapel.

**SEES PROSPERITY
FOR LONDON FIRMS**

General Superintendent of
Transportation For C.N.R.
Optimistic on Visit Here.

"At the present time the C. N. R. is keeping a well-maintained level of prosperity," stated C. R. Moore, general superintendent of transportation for that railroad, who passed through London en route from Stratford to Toronto. "We are constantly alert to attract business to its rails, and as Canada for the most part is now prosperous and business is picking up fairly generally, there is no reason why our business should not increase, although right now there is no startling change for the better."

Mr. Moore could give no information whatever as to the actions of his railway in demanding a cut in the coal rates of the L. & P. S., nor on London's most needed new railway station.

He was very optimistic for the business future of this district and for all Canada. Remarkable the increase in business of the London Industries, he expressed belief that it would increase still further.

HONORED BY AMERICAN.

Copenhagen, Nov. 26.—Tribute to the late Queen Mother Alexandra of England, daughter of the royal house of Denmark, was paid by John D. Prince, the United States minister at the Thanksgiving dinner of the American club this evening.

"Before the address tonight in connection with the Thanksgiving festival," said Minister Prince, "I wish to express the deepest sympathy for the Danish people in the passing of that splendid woman, Queen Mother Alexandra. She was known and beloved throughout the world as a mother, a wife, a daughter, wife and mother, and her name is honored and revered throughout the whole world, and nowhere more than the United States."

FLOWERS FILL BALLROOM.

London, Nov. 26.—The first stage of the transfer of the body of the late Queen Mother Alexandra from her country home at Sandringham to the last resting place of the body at Windsor was made today.

After a short service this morning in the Sandringham church, where the body had lain since the queen mother's death, the coffin was placed on a gun carriage drawn by four horses for the journey of nearly three miles to the Wolferton railway station, King George, Prince of Wales, the Duke of York, Prince Henry, and a few of the other male relatives of the late queen, walked behind the gun carriage. They were followed by carriages containing Queen Mary, the daughters of Queen Alexandra and other ladies of the royal entourage.

There were no troops in attendance with the exception of a handful in charge of the gun carriage, but a long line of villagers and neighbors followed the royal mourning party, while others showed their sympathy by lining the route of the procession.

Upon the arrival of the body at the Wolferton station the coffin was placed on board a train which bore it and the attendant royal party to London, where the coffin was taken to the chapel of the royal St. James' palace for use tonight.

An immense number of wreaths from all parts of the country that had arrived since the queen mother's death at Sandringham and which literally filled the ballroom of the palace were taken thence to Wolferton by wagon and placed on the train for transfer to London.

THE BECK MEMORIAL POSTCARD.

Appeal Being Sent to 416,000 Consumers in 400 Ontario Towns,
Cities and Villages Benefitted by Creation of Hydro
Scheme by Late Sir Adam Beck.

Believing that those who benefit directly from Sir Adam Beck's great hydro-electric undertakings will be ready to show their appreciation, the hydro-electric power commission has brought forward an ingenious method of testing public gratitude. As a means of "mopping up" in the Beck memorial endowment campaign to raise \$500,000 in aid of Queen Alexandra sanatorium and its province-wide war against tuberculosis, a postcard appeal is being sent to every hydro consumer. There are more than 416,000 in all in about 400 Ontario cities, towns and villages now served by this titanic creation of the late hydro knight.

The postcard message emphasizes that "in founding that great public service—the Hydro—has endeared his name to every household in Ontario. Through his efforts in bringing hydro into every home, emancipation from drudgery of the Ontario household is a realization; and, too, countless millions are annually saved to the people—hydro users—through rates of about one-third of those in force before his great work began. This appeal is now made to turn part of these tremendous savings into a memorial endowment, immortalizing the name of this great benefactor."

There is a return section, illustrated above, by means of which any hydro consumer may give tangible expression to his appreciation of this service. Simply place an "X" mark in the space opposite the amount you desire to give. If it is more than \$10, fill in the amount in the blank space on the top. If it is less than 50 cents, fill in on the lower line with the number of months desired. The card may then be signed with the name and address of the donor and mailed back to Hydro. By this authority the sum will then be added to the consumers' hydro bill for the period authorized. Everyone is expected by the committee to make some contribution, big or little. Sydney, Australia, Nov. 27.—The New South Wales legislative assembly has passed the first reading of the government bill providing for the payment of weekly pensions to widows. It is proposed to pay £1 a week to a widow with children, and for each child she has under 14 years of age, 10 shillings additional.

The cost of the new pension scheme is estimated at £500,000 a year.

BEATTY EXPLAINS C.P.R. STAND ON COAL RATE

At Present on Non-Remunerative Basis, He Tells Advertiser in Telegram.

Every day in every way the case of the London and Port Stanley Railway protesting the proposed action of the C. N. R. and C. P. R. to abolish the present coal rate from Port Stanley to points east of Woodstock, grows stronger and stronger. This is the opinion of local men vitally interested in the matter.

"They can't do a thing until the question comes before the dominion railway board, and such has been the Hamilton and Toronto that I feel the union protest from Western Ontario, board will think twice before passing the death knell of the L. & P. S., for that is what it would be if the big railroads were to have their way," declared one man.

"They can't stand out against public opinion. They found that out when the Crown's West Pass freight rate was up for revision."

That the Canadian Pacific and the Canadian National have taken joint action in an appeal to the dominion railway commission to have the freight rates on coal from Port Stanley to points east of Woodstock cancelled not because they desire to strangle the L. & P. S. road, but because the present rates are on a non-remunerative basis, is the declaration of Edward W. Beatty, president of the C. P. R., in a telegram to The Advertiser.

The telegram points out that the action was decided upon only after a joint conference of officials of the two roads, and that they are acting as a unit in the matter. It also states that freight traffic managers of both roads were leaving for Toronto to discuss the matter with a joint meeting of the Toronto board of trade and the Canadian Manufacturers' association.

Commenting on the telegram, an official of the L. & P. S. stated that should the rate be cancelled it would mean the abolition of the "Buffalo rate" of \$1.40 per ton on coal from Buffalo to Western Ontario and higher freight rates dictated by the two big railroads. The L. & P. S. had not been notified of any meeting in Toronto and consequently would not have a representative there.

**TURKEY HAS REFUSED
ARBITRATION PLAN**

Council of Ministers Refuse to Comply With Ruling of League.
