Our own advices reported the market unchanged, while private cables from Liverpool quoted them easier, at 10½c to 11c for best grades, and London advices noted a decline of ½c to 1c per lb., quoting 10½c as against 1ic to 12c on Thursday last. Holland has prohibited the importation of American live cattle and fresh beef, on the ground that in several cargoes which have arrived a number of the animals were suffering from Texas fever. The impression among shippers here in regard to this action is that it will, no doubt, help the shipments of Canadian cattle which are being made from this port, and higher prices will probably be realized.




