Last night's council meeting was a lively one. Nothing of any moment was brought up but the various debates were distinguished by several lively passages at arms. between the speakers of the civic assembly. Ald. Baxter grew eloquent in behalf of granting \$1000 instead of \$500 towards the Ryerson memorial fund, but was brought up short when Ald. Frankland in firmed hum that all those hand-Frankland informed him that all those hand-ing the fund wanted was the latter sum, and
