**BROOKE COUNCIL.**  
 Alvinston, 4th August, 1906.  
 Council met pursuant to adjournment. Members all present.  
 Minutes of previous meeting read, and on motion of Kelly and Munroe were approved.

Bylaw No. 8 introduced and read, authorizing a loan of \$200 to the owner of lot 11, con. 7.  
 McIntyre-Kelly, that the bylaw be read a third time and finally passed.—Carried.  
 Certificates were received and read from R. S. Code, stating that certain uncompleted portions of the Patterson-Bell award drain No. 1, had been let by him, that work was now done, and that the following accounts were due the contractors:—George White, \$44.00, chargeable to lots 11 and 12, con. 6; N. H. Gaffney, \$93.00, chargeable to lots 11 and 12, con. 6; N. H. Gaffney, \$10.00, chargeable to lot 12, con. 6.

McIntyre-Spearman—that orders be issued in payment of White and Gaffney and that these payments and the engineer's fees be entertained against lots mentioned, with 7% added thereto if not paid before entry on collector's roll for 1906.—Carried.  
 Mr. W. J. Lamb, on behalf of his mother, the owner of lot 13, con. 2, applied for recompense for damage done said lot by the waters from 12-13 sideroad drain. Council agreed to have a look at the locality.

Correspondence re road to W. S. Kelly's farm submitted and read. Reeve agreed to examine same.  
 Wm. Warden asked that the drain across the north end of lot 15, con. 4, on road, be cleaned out. Council agreed to furnish tile for tiling drain if parties interested drew them and put them in.  
 Parties for and against the closing of the forced road between lots 14 and 15, con. 14, were heard.

Mr. John Hillis claimed he still owned 2 acres of the n e pt of the s pt of lot 14, con. 14, and to close road would prevent access to it.  
 Mr. H. Lett stated Thomas Hillis and sons had deeded him 150 acres, producing affidavits they had made stating they were the owners. He said that at time of purchasing land Mr. John Hillis was talking to him of the sale and did not claim any ownership of any part of it, he and Mr. Leacock wished road closed up as being wholly unnecessary to the public and a nuisance to them.

Munroe-Kelly—that road be closed up and a bylaw authorizing said closing introduced and read.—Carried.  
 Munroe-Spearman—that council open as a Court of Revision on the Smith drain bylaw. The reve in the chair.—Carried.  
 Declarations taken. Three appeals.  
 W. H. Risk, sworn said, I own a pt 15, con. 5, 50 acres. Tile does not come near my land, and I cannot drain more than 20 acres of it. Do not set a fair share of the rebate allowed on old drain and am assessed to high.

A. W. Wallis, sworn said, I own the west 20 acres of 15, con. 6. Am assessed too high, the lots to the west should be assessed higher.  
 A. S. Smith, sworn said, I own a pt 15, con. 6, 80 acres, am assessed too high in comparison with lots 13 and 14.  
 Darvill-Spearman—that the sum of \$22 be struck off the assessment of n e pt lot 15, con. 6. That this sum be divided and added as follows: To lot 13, con. 6, \$2.00; to 13, con. 6, \$2.00; to 14, \$6.00; to e pt 15, \$8.00, and on township for roads, \$4.00. That clerk notify parties of these adjustments.

 Declarations taken. Two appeals.  
 Andrew Gray, sworn said, I own lot 20, con. 3. Am assessed too high in comparison with w 1/2 20 and lot 21, con. 4.  
 A. L. Turner, sworn said, I own e pt 20, con. 4. Am assessed too high, more than half my land drains into the Gray drain.  
 Alex. Leitch, owner 19, con. 3, maintained he was assessed too high.

McIntyre-Darvill—that the sum of \$20 be struck off lot e pt 20, con. 4, and this amount added to the assessment against lot 21, con. 4; \$7 against the 13, and \$13 against the n 1/2 of lot 10 to be adjourned till 2.30 o'clock p. m. on Saturday, 1st day of Sept., next, in the village of Inwood, to enable clerk to notify parties of these adjustments.—Carried.

James Stevens applied for pay for 2 lambs killed by Dogs and 1 injured, valued at \$18, and on motion of Spearman and Munroe Mr. Stevens was paid the sum of \$8.66 being 3/4 value of loss.  
 McIntyre-Munroe—that bylaw authorizing the closing up of forced road between lots 14 and 15, con. 14, be read a second time.—Carried and read.  
 Bylaws were submitted authorizing the necessary work on the Warden-McKellar and Dolbear-McKellar drains and the borrowing by debenture of the funds required.

Kelly-Munroe—that bylaws be provisionally adopted, printed, pamphlet form and copies served on each of the parties assessed, with notice that a Court of Revision on them would be opened in Inwood on Saturday, 1st Sept., 1906. John Spearman to be appointed commissioner over drains and to serve copies of bylaws.—Carried.  
 Darvill-Spearman—that bylaw No. 9 authorizing the closing up of the forced road between lots 14 and 15 in the 14th concession, be read a third time and finally passed.—Carried, and bylaw read and passed.

Kelly-Spearman—that bylaw No. 10 authorizing the construction of the Watson drain and the borrowing by debenture of the funds required for the work, be read a third time and finally passed.—Carried, and read and passed.  
 McIntyre-Spearman—that Council do now adjourn to meet in the village of Inwood on Saturday, Sept. 1, 1906.—Carried.

**LITTLE BELL BIOGRAPHIES**  
**Mozart**  
**WOLFGANG AMADEUS MOZART**, though but 35 years old at his death, left a name second only to Bach's. He was born in 1756 and died in 1791. He was the first "infant prodigy" of the musical world, and his career proves the necessity of having good music in the home for the making of a musician.

When four he was placed under a teacher and even then composed short pieces which astonished his parents and instructor. At seven he played so wonderfully that he made a concert tour of Europe. Before he was ten he had written six sonatas, one composition for full orchestra, and an oratorio. At twelve he wielded the conductor's baton. Of his many compositions the most popular are his opera, "The Magic Flute," and his "Requiem," the latter sung by some friends and himself as his eyes closed in death.
