Leslie Oke, M. L. A., St.
of Editorial in The Farmer
Sun

TRUE TO COLORS

Claim Local Member Has D.
Issue For Other U. F. O. Men

In a signed editorial by A. Bridger, The Farmers' Sun its editor, to Leslie W. Oke, P.P. for East Lambton, who repudiated the leadership of Hon. W. E. Raney and withdrew from the Progressive group in the legislature.

After discussing the reason by Mr. Oke for his action, the editorial "unhesitatingly expresses the view that Leslie Oke has taken the only possible course open to an honest man. Judging the whole strictly on its merits, we cannot, however, under any circumstances, could have taken any other step, he has done and at the same time retain his own self-respect."

"Not Entitled to Support." After referring to Mr. Oke's statement that the Progressive in the legislature is in no way charged with the advancement of U. F. O. principles and ideals, the editorial remarks that, if this is the group of which Mr. Raney leader "is not entitled to the best measure of support the U. F. O. as an organization, or from members individually, collect or any other way."

In For Rough Time? "Further than that," the editorial continues, "if the newly formed party of which Hon. W. E. Raney is the leader in the legislature Mr. Oke asserts, not charged with the advancement of the U. F. O. and principles, then, whatever pretension one may put upon the resolution passed by the U. F. O. on precisely the same basis, it is painfully apparent to this political party that it is open criticism and opposition of the U. F. O. on precisely the same basis as other political party. Further than that, this new political party open to the most rigorous condition and opposition of the state kind if, sailing under false colors, attempts to promulgate policies are not in accord with U. F. O. principles and ideals."

Basis of Repudiation In repudiating the leaders Mr. Raney, Mr. Oke based his on his interpretation of the "riding autonomy", one of the final principles of the U. F. O. The \$10,548.43 being made up of fertilizer, binder twine, fence posts, flour and feed. The Company carries its own stock on stock shipped and owing to management the losses were very small, leaving a substantial amount to insurance account.
