From a small beginning, the scallop enterprise in Nova Scotia is fast coming to the front. Four years ago the Digby and LaHave beds were the only area, worked or known in the South Shore waters. Nothing came of that suggestion, beyond a consideration at headquarters. In my next report-1922. page 28-I cited, as one of the needed improvements: "Prospecting for scallop beds along the whole coast, and also experiments in ovster-planting in the South Shore waters." A boat was detailed for the purpose, and tested the grounds from Digby Gut almost to Spencer's Island, finding a line of beds for the whole distance. This year the scope of the search was widened and nearly all rakings gave good results. Mr. Ward Fisher, Chie?
