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



VORKSHIKE PUDDENG.—Make a thin batter, as for frying, with a pint of milk and some flour; stages with salt, preper, and a little nutneg grand fine. The batter should be perfectly smooth. Beat it well with a fork for some minutes, then pour the mixture, to the thickness of an inch, into a tin buttered freely, and put it into the oven. When the pudding is set, lay it in the tin, slanting in front of the fire under the beef which is roasting, and when the top is well browned take the pudding out of the tin and expose the under side of it to the action of the fire. When done, cut it up in diamond-shaped pieces, and garnish the joint with them. with them.
