On January 13th, Bawlf and Cloutier met on the Junior's rink, and entertained the spectators with an excellent exhibition of hockey. Bawlf was the star of the rink; he evinced a thorough knowledge of the secrets of hockey. When the referee's whistle blew to announce the end of the game, the score stood 6 to 0 in favor of Bawlf.
