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THE WALDENSIAN CHURCH AT TURIN.

Turin is celebrated for its Superga, a vast and rangnificent temple of Popery, situated on the summit of a hill, within a few miles of the capital. We have gazed with admiration on its architectural beauty—we have been attracted by the gorgeous stateliness of its halls, and wondered at the splendour of its royal sepulchres; but, alas, it is a temple of a degraded and childish superstition; and sad, indeed, was it to witness the devotée of Rome going the round of his perpetual mass to obtain the release of the souls of sceptred kings from the pains of purgatory.
