> LAKE SUPERIOR COPPER MINES. (From a Correspondent of the Colonist.)

Our first visit was to the new unworked oxide (black) vein of the Pittsburg county, in the mountains of Copper Harbour; the vicinity of which contains an unlimited quantity of manganese; but no extensive operations have taken place in that immediate the contains and the contains the outlay.

No inducement existing to remain, we, after a two days ramble, shoved off our boat for Agate Harbour. Here again we found one of those extraordinary recesses in the rocky shore which form a safe and commodious retreat for vessels and smaller craft, and with many fathoms of water up to the very bank. Nor have its advantages been overlooked. A promising vein of native copper combined with sulphate of Barytes has been here somewhat extensively worked; but its exploration is now temporarily suspended in consequence of the paucity of hands, and the fact that the company to whom the location belongs, have discovered, and are working what they consider a more profitable one, at a few miles distance. We were receiva more profitable one, at a few miles distance. We were receiv ed with exceeding politeness by the resident agent, who kindly gave us some specimens, and after partaking of a hearty lunch, left for "Eagle Harbour," which certainly far surpasses its brethren in beauty.

We were up with the sun, and proceeded with the intelligent agent, Mr. F. to visit the adjoining mine. The works commence immediately on the shore, about half a mile west of the entrance of the harbour, and a few miners were employed un-Covering a rich vein of "Native Copper," thirteen feet in width.

The land here trends gently to the water, from the bluffs in
