CANADIAN EMBASSY IN MOSCOW—SOVIET EMBASSY IN OTTAWA—LOCAL STAFF

Question No. 69—Mr. Cossitt:

1. What is the number of persons employed by the Canadian Embassy in Moscow who are not Canadian citizens and, in each case, what is his/her (a) name and address (b) salary (c) job designation (d) date of appointment (e) country of origin and citizenship?

2. To the knowledge of the government, what is the number of persons employed by the Soviet embassy in Ottawa who are Canadian citizens and, in each case, what is his/her (a) name and address (b) salary (c) job designation (d) date of appointment?

3. If any of the persons in part 2 are not native born Canadians, what was their country of origin?

4. Have any persons who are not Canadian citizens and who were employed by the Canadian embassy in Moscow, left such employment in the past six months and, if so, in each case, what is his/her (a) name (b) address (c) reason for leaving?

Hon. Mark MacGuigan (Secretary of State for External Affairs): 1. There are presently 27 persons employed by the Canadian embassy in Moscow who are not Canadian citizens. Following are the salaries, functions, date of appointment and country of origin of each one.
