REMARKS.

Sixty-six (66) miles of this southerly line via Salmon River and Grand Mira are one common to a Local and National Line trunk, the eastern end of which is but 14 miles to Sydney and 16 miles to Louisburg (strongly recommended by Sir Charles Tupper).

This alone sufficiently damaging to the Central route.

Disinterested men who know say it is impossible in winter to run a boat large enough to carry a train across here regularly, owing to forming and floating ice.

A fish and coal producing district is a flour consuming one (an item which ought to be considered by the Government from an economical point of view in operating railway).
