MINES COMPLIED
WITH HAGUE RULES

Representatives of Norway, Sweden and Denmark So Decide.

CHRISTIANIA, Feb. 19.—(Via London, Feb. 20, 2:25 a.m.)—The conference of representatives of Norway, Sweden and Denmark, held here from Feb. 18 to 15, established the fact that all mines hitherto found in the Skagerrack and in the northern part of the Kattegat satisfied conditions of the Convention of The Hague, namely, being disarmed when disengaged from their anchors.

The conference agreed upon mutual co-operation in the giving of speedy notification of the presence of mines and torpedoes in these waters, and in searching for and disarming mines, etc.

OPPOSING ARMIES
ON BANKS OF PRUTH

Russians and Austrians in Battle Near Roumanian Frontier.

Canadian Press Despatch.

LONDON, Feb. 20, 3:10 a.m.—The Daily Mail's correspondent at Marmonville, on the Roumanian frontier, telegraphing under today's date says:

"Russian and Austrian troops are facing each other on the banks of Pruth, where the opening of a battle can be observed from here. There are evidences that the line of the River Pruth constitutes a Russian frontier. The troops are knee-deep in snow."

GERMAN ATTACKS
FAIL EVERYWHERE

French Official Report Shows Positions Were Maintained Generally.

GAIN IN CHAMPAGNE

Five Counter Attacks by Enemy Ended in Complete Failure.

CANADIAN PRESS DESPATCH.

PARIS, Feb. 19, 11:05 p.m.—The following French official statement was given out here tonight:

"In Belgium we repulsed an attack against our trenches to the east of Ypres. The front line of the enemy included five companies.

"Near Rodolincourt, to the north of Arras, an attempt by the Germans to attack our positions was stopped.

"In the Champagne, in the regions of Souain, Perthes and Beaunejour, the enemy, on the night of Feb. 18-19, made five counterattacks with a view to recapturing the trenches lost by him during the previous days. All the attacks were repulsed. The struggle still continues and we have made further progress.

"In the argonne some coups de main attempted by the Germans in the night of Feb. 18-19 failed. We blew up a blockhouse, occupying the place where it had stood.

Enemy's Attacks Failed.

"On the heights of the Meuse, at Les Eparges, three German counterattacks against the trenches were captured on the 17th instant, were repulsed by the fire of our artillery.

"In the Vosges, between Luise and Wissembach, in the region of the Bonhomme Pass, the Germans, after succeeding in gaining a foothold on hill 607, which they attacked with a regiment, were thrown out in the morning as the consequence of an attack by one company and a half of our troops. Since then we have maintained ourselves in that position in spite of the violent efforts of the Germans to recapture it. We also have repulsed an attack by the Germans against the northern ridge of the Sudel farm."

DENMARK FOILS GERMAN TRICK TO GET COPPER

Making of Million Copper Plates With Photograph of Kaiser Stopped.

COPENHAGEN, Feb. 19.—The Danish metal factory in Jutland recently received an order from a German manufacturer to make a million copper platelets with the Kaiser's portrait engraved on each. The Germans hoped that these would be allowed to be exported as works of art, but the Danish authorities stepped in and have forbidden this attempt to obtain copper by tricks.

GROSS EXAGGERATIONS IN AUSTRIAN CLAIMS

Russians Deny Twenty-Nine Thousand Prisoners Were Captured of Late.

Canadian Press Despatch.

PETROGRAD, via London, Feb. 20, 2:20 a.m.—The Russian headquarters staff, in a statement referring to a recent Austrian official statement, declare that the Austrians' assertions that they captured 29,000 Russian prisoners during the retreat in Bukovina, during the winter, is stated, exceeds the total number of Russians engaged on this front, and the actual Russian losses were seven officers and 1,400 soldiers killed, wounded and missing.
