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AS the Author of these Considerations has ventured to differ from the commonly received opinion, it may be of use to confirm his sentiments with the highest and most unexceptionable authority; that of his Prussian Majesty, who, in a writing, said to have been drawn up by himself, speaks in the following manner :

“ AS no German prince has a right to meddle with the internal policy of Great Britain, nor with the constitution of its government ; I have some reasons to hope, that the English nation will not meddle with the domestic affairs of the Empire. And I entertain those hopes the more ; because England has no reason to meddle with this quarrel from any consideration of its commerce, or otherwise. And although it had a greater inclination for one German court than for another, yet I think it too unreasonable to pretend, that such powerful and respectable princes, as those of the Empire are, should be obliged to rule their conduct upon the inclinations of those amongst the English, who strive to make
