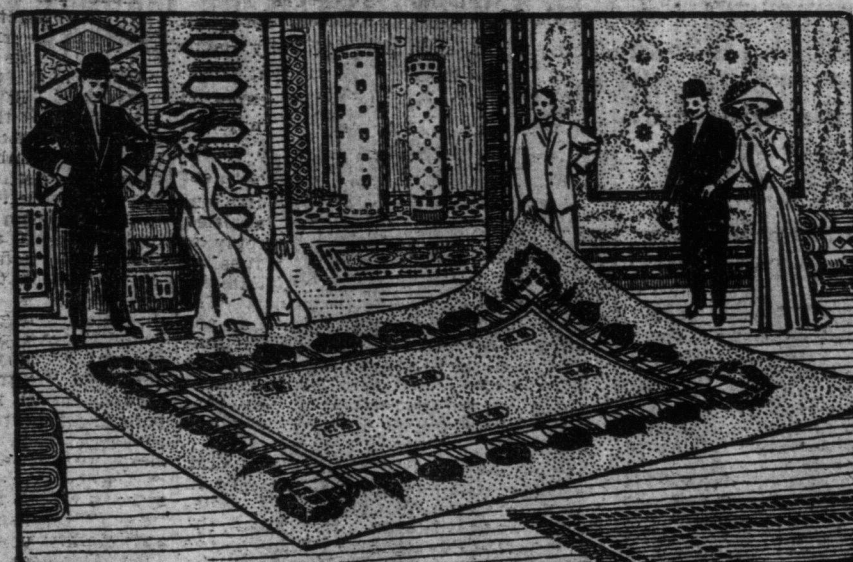

## HUGE SUPPLY OF PEAT CAN BE USED AS COAL

Canada's Large Areas Can Keep Over 5,000,000 Families for 100 Years.

It is comforting to know, on the assurance of the best authority, Eugene Haanel of the Dominion Department of Mines that even in zero blizzard weather there is no danger of a failure of the fuel supply in Canada. The assurances were tendered by Mr. Haanel to the Canadian Club yesterday in an address on the value of our peat deposits.

There are 12,000 square miles of peat bogs in Ontario and Manitoba, enough to supply 5,306,078 families with fuel equal to ten tons of good coal each for 100 years. Which will last our present time.

Besides peat we have what wood is left, oil, the oil shales of New Brunswick, lignite in Manitoba and water-power. Only a little ingenuity is required to keep warm.

In 1909 we imported nearly ten million tons of coal, worth \$26,831,859. This money might be kept at home if peat were used.

The Dominion sent a member of the mines staff to Europe to investigate the peat situation and he became such an expert that the Iron and Steel Institute of Sweden engaged his services after he had made his report to the government. Three hundred acres of bog were acquired by the government, with an average depth of eight feet, and a peat fuel plant such as is used in Sweden and Russia has been erected. The results are excellent. Russia has 1300 such plants, producing about 6,000,000 tons of fuel per year.

The fuel is specially adapted for grates, cooking stoves and wood stoves. For the grate it is superior to cannel coal.

It burns with a clear, luminous flame, without poking. It does not eject burning particles. It leaves no unburnt material, and the ash is soft powder. It does not soil the hands, nor cover the back of the grate with soot, and a form in which peat is much favored is dry powder. Blown under a boiler it burns with a long, hot, smokeless flame, leaving no unburnt particles. The flame is readily regulated, extinguished and relighted.

Mr. Haanel gave many figures to show the profitable nature of the fuel as an economic factor. The cost of coal for steam plant for one h.p. year of 6000 hours being \$90, and of coal for gas producer \$18, the cost of peat gas producer would be only \$7.50.

R. McEwen's Death. R. McEwen, general baggage agent of the Richelieu & Ontario Navigation Company, died suddenly in Montreal last night. The late Mr. McEwen was the oldest employee of the company, having been in its service for about 50 years. He was formerly general freight agent.

## AEROPLANE SCOUTING

Americans Will Use Flier Along the Mexican Border.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—So far as an aeroplane can discover the U. S. Government will probably soon be in a position to determine the facts as to the activities of the insurgents along the Mexican border. At present, owing to the conflicting reports and abiding and extravagant claims on the part of the different leaders and their neutrality law, troops are continually making wild goose chases after military expeditions reported to be crossing the Rio Grande, which rarely materialize. When the troops are on these false scents, it is presumed that armed parties make their way across the river at unguarded points.

Clark's Tourists on the "Arabic" Off For a Winter Cruise.

With a passenger list of over six hundred names from more than forty states and the Dominion of Canada, the Clark cruising steamer, Arabic, leaves on Feb. 4, on her annual trip to the Mediterranean.

The itinerary of the cruise, comprises a total distance traveled in the sum of fourteen thousand, nine hundred and forty (14,940) miles; visiting Spain, Algiers, Malta, Greece, Turkey, the Holy Lands, Egypt, the Nile, Italy and the Riviera, and the party will not be back until April.

The Annual Clark Cruise is a well-established feature and is favorably known throughout the breadth of the United States, as is evidenced by the number of states represented in the passenger list every year.

## BOTH CLAIM INSURANCE

James Clark Left Policy on Which Widow Says She Paid Premiums.

An insurance case with a family at war over a \$3000 L.O.P. policy is being heard before Justice Middleton in the non-jury session court. The plaintiff is Mrs. Jane Clark, second wife of the late James Clark, whose policy is being contested, and her daughter, May Clark, while the defendant is Florence Loftus, wife of Dr. Loftus, dentist, and stepdaughter of Mrs. Clark, the plaintiff.

According to the wife's evidence Clark left his wife in November, 1909, and from then until his death lived with Mrs. Loftus, also Mrs. Clark continued paying the premiums and dues as she had done since 1900, when Clark failed in business. She understood that the policy would be divided between herself, her daughter and stepdaughter, whereas Mrs. Loftus claims she is the only one mentioned as a beneficiary. The case will continue to-day.

ON Y'S POPULATION 424,057.

The population of Toronto is about 324,057, according to the statistics compiled by the publishers of *Might's Directory for 1911*. The city contains 132 streets, and 76,581 buildings of all kinds, which indicates an increase in the latter of 70% over last year. Of these 3724 are shown vacant, as compared with 3625 in the last edition.

## TOBACCO SUIT'S NEW TURN

Claim Made That Assets Were Improperly Sold to Col. McAlpine.

An important suit involving \$130,000 began in the non-jury civil session court yesterday before Justice Riddell, being another side of an action brought some time ago in which the litigants were the McAlpine Consumers Tobacco Co. and the McAlpine Tobacco Co. The plaintiffs yesterday were: O. E. Fleming, J. A. Strath and Robert Pinchin, arrayed against General E. A. McAlpine, Chas. Pratt, the McAlpine Consumers Tobacco Company, and Col. B. B. McAlpine.

The claim of the plaintiffs is that a majority of the board of directors of the company fraudulently sold the assets of the company to Col. B. B. McAlpine for the sum of \$130,000, while the defence declare that all the proceedings were of a legal character, and when it was seen that the company could do business no longer, a notice was sent to the shareholders notifying them that the stock would be sold to the highest bidder, who proved to be Col. McAlpine. The case will proceed to-day.

FOLLOWING TORONTO'S LEAD.

WINNIPEG, Feb. 6.—An agitation among consumers here over gas bills has reached the city hall. It is likely that the council will be urged to take action towards securing a reduction of the rate.

The present rates are \$1.20 to \$1.35 per thousand net. Efforts will be made to secure an agreement similar to that in Toronto, where rates have been lowered to 70 cents.

POWER FOR EASTERN TOWNS.

KINGSTON, Feb. 6.—(Special).—Ald. R. H. Toye went to Toronto to-day to interview Hon. Adam Beck regarding power for Eastern Ontario municipalities. He will also visit Brantford and Guelph, to inspect garbage systems.

Want Better Food.

MONTREAL, Feb. 6.—Claiming that their food is not fit to eat, the students of the Presbyterian Theological College threaten to leave the college in a body unless some change is made. Independent riots have broken out in the dining-room on several occasions, and recently the trouble came to a head, when the students complained to the faculty.

A Farmer's Suicide.

BROCKVILLE, Feb. 6.—(Special).—Albert Carroll, a prosperous farmer, living three miles from Westport Village, committed suicide by drinking carbolic acid. Worried over a recent business transaction is reported to have caused mental derangement, with the above result. Carroll leaves a widow and family.

Another Yonge Street Farm.

Miss Sheppard, who owns 210 acres at the northwest corner of Yonge-street and Lansing-shelton, exactly seven and a half miles from the corner of King and Yonge, refused \$290 an acre for the property.

## ENGINEER ERRETT'S MISTAKE

Superintendent Gillen Says Signal Code Rules Were Disregarded.

Grand Trunk Superintendent Gillen, when interviewed yesterday concerning Saturday night's wreck near Paris, said that the collision would not have occurred had Engineer Errett of the mogul engine complied with the rules of the signal code.

The official admitted the entire loss of the baggage and mail car, the complete destruction of three first-class coaches and the putting out of business for two months of two engines. Exclusive of any claims which may be brought against the company, Superintendent Gillen estimated that the accident would mean a loss of between \$10,000 and \$24,000 to the Grand Trunk.
