THREE RECORDS BROKEN AT UNIVERSITY MEET

Mel. Brack and Bricker Set Up New Marks—McGill the Champions, Varsity Second—Results

MONTREAL, Oct. 30.—The McGill track team today averaged the defeat inflicted on the football team by Toronto Varsity Saturday by winning a most decisive victory in the annual intercollegiate track and field games. Four colleges competed, the final standing being as follows: McGill 68, Toronto University 40, Queen's 12, Royal Military College 2.

Despite the fact that the weather was very cold, the performances on the whole were good, three intercollegiate records being broken.

Brook of Varsity ran a pretty race in the half-mile and clipped one-fifth of a second off the old mark, doing the 400 yards in 1 minute and 15 seconds. He also won the quarter, although he failed to break the record.

Bricker, another Toronto man, added a foot and an inch to the pole vault mark when he cleared 14 feet 6 inches. Outside of these two men the Toronto team was weak. Bricker, the best of their sprinters, not being in the same class as Hollander of McGill.

Ken Dowie of McGill made the third new record when he did the hurdles in 14 seconds.

In the weights, McDougall of McGill had it all his own way, winning discus, hammer and shot-put. He did not, however, succeed in breaking the record in the hammer.

The McKinnon brothers of Queens did well in the weight events, as usual, and Sydney McKinnon was the most of the dozen points of Kingston.
