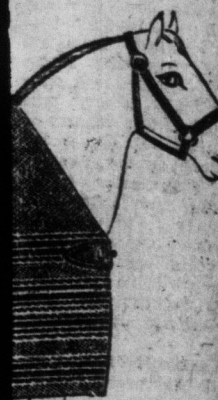

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 18.—Yale went down to defeat before a Princeton eleven this afternoon at Yale Field for the first time in eight years and from the serrated turf, which bore the marks of a terrific battle, rose the orange and black claim to football supremacy of the east. She had won from Yale by 6 to 3.

This was as decisive in figures as her score over Harvard. It was a great victory for the men of Princeton, who came to the field in the rain, and the game, played partly in brilliant sunshine, which dispelled memories of the morning's rain and closing under gray skies, and in a chilly breeze, was one of the most remarkable in recent years.

Dick Croker Wins \$30,000 and Heads Owners in Ireland

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—Richard Croker, who returned to this city yesterday on the Mauretania, said that he has a colt engaged in the Derby of 1912 which may surpass the turf entries. He would not name the colt, but the only entry in his name is Farrier, a brown colt by Fairman, out of St. Irma, which won once out of three starts in Ireland in 1911. When beaten in one race he carried 134 pounds and ran fourth.

Mr. Croker is the leading winning owner of this year in Ireland with a total of \$30,000. His best two-year-old was Amsterdam, a daughter of the Yankee stallion Americus.
