Y. & N. O. GENERAL OFFICES NORTH BAY TO HAVE THEM

Building to Cost About \$30,000 to Be Erected by Government.

Tenders are being called for by the Y. & N. O. Railway Commission for the construction of general offices at North Bay. A building to accommodate the staff of all the departments, at present scattered about that town, as well as the accounting staff now located in Toronto, is contemplated, the cost being placed at \$25,000 or \$30,000. North Bay is the starting point of the railway at present, and the intended development of the line northwards will require headquarters of this description. The telegraph and telephone departments will also be located in the new building. The office of the commission and the secretary-treasurer will remain in Toronto. The net earnings of the government railway for the ten months ending October amounted to \$153,071. For October the gross earnings were \$32,218, the operating expenses \$14,560. In October, 1906, the earnings and expenses respectively were \$32,523 and \$15,056.

FIRM LOSE ON RAILWAY.

Canadian Associated Press Cable, London, Jan. 9.—In the court of session at Edinburgh the record was closed by Lord MacKenzie in an action by the directors of the Discontesellschaft of London and Berlin against the Bruce Peebles Company of Edinburgh for payment of £400, contained in a bill of exchange. The defendants deny that they contracted to supply material for an electric railway in Canada for the Canadian Electric Traction Company and with the Ganz Company, for certain plant which that firm had patented. The system proved a failure, and the defendants sustained a loss of more than £400, for which they held the Ganz Company responsible.

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS HERALD WINS LABEL SUIT CANFIELD BODY EXHUMED

Sudden Death of Henry Perkins Arouses Suspicion—Death of George McKeand.

Hamilton, Jan. 9.—(Special).—At the assize court this evening The Herald won out in the libel suit brought by William Hopkins, a bridge tender at the beach, the jury bringing in a verdict for the defendant, saddling the costs upon the plaintiff. The article complained of was to the effect that Hopkins had been the victim of an outrage, being pelted by rotten eggs because he was slow at turning the bridge for small boats. Most of the information was furnished in a type-written statement. It turned out that Hopkins was not the victim of the egg throwing, and The Herald promptly apologized. Justice Clute told the jurors that they had to decide whether the article was written in good faith, if reasonable care had been taken to find the truth of the story and if ample apology had been made. The jury decided in less than an hour that there was no case against The Herald. J. W. Nesbitt, K.C., and J. Soule appeared for The Herald.

Continued From Page 1. man life, had raged within a few miles of the capital. The strike record for five years showed 104 in 1901, 122 in 1902, 169 in 1903, 109 in 1904 and 87 in 1905. In 1906 there had been serious labor troubles, and the Lethbridge strike had exposed the people of Saskatchewan to a fuel famine, which threatened the lives of many citizens. In New Zealand the government retained coal lands, and it was always prepared to take over and operate coal mines. The progressive colony had a compulsory arbitration act, and the speaker was of the opinion that a similar act could be enforced in Canada.

LABOR'S VOICE

Mr. Verville, the labor member from Montreal, opposed compulsory arbitration. He did not favor the appointment of a committee. It would be an expensive affair should the committee attempt to travel about the country for examination, and he waited for witnesses to come to them; it would result in the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, the railway companies and employers generally being heard, while the laboring people would not have the means to come and testify.

He submitted that each member of parliament could study the labor situation in his own riding and also keep with the subject generally by reading The Labor Gazette. He favored Mr. Lemieux's bill, and made the remarkable statement that "no legislation" was better than no legislation, because bad legislation could be amended.

FAVORS A BILL

Mr. Lemieux (Liberal, B.C.), who is prominent in labor circles, offered an amendment to his bill, which was not yet taken into consideration. It provided not only for arbitration, but forbade any strike or lockout while the matter is in progress. True, neither party was bound to accept the reward, but he submitted that compulsory arbitration, which would apply, not only to coal mines, but to all public utilities. The Conciliation Act had failed in the Buckingham strike, and that the award respected was strictly observed. He claimed, however, that as a result of the arbitration on the latter case the parties had an agreement.
