Ottawa, Feb. 24.-(Special.)-There
is a lively ussue going on in Cabinet
circles over the Crow's Nest Railway
charter. Mr. Blair, since his visit to
the Kootenay Country, has become an
ardent advocate of Government con-
struction and operation of the road, and
is, therefore, opposed to the C.P.R.
securing a monopoly of the pass. On
the other hand an apparent majority of
the Ministers are in favor of the big
transcontinental company building the
line.

Mr. Milne of Victoria, who advocates
an independent or Government road
from the coast to Alberta, has returned
to Ottawa to endeavor to effect
C.P.R. influence.

NORTHWEST CREAMERIES.
According to advice which
reached the Department of Agriculture,
Prof. Robertson has been instrumental
in the Northwest in arranging for the
establishment of creameries under
Government management, with
fourteen cream-gathering stations,
in addition to supplying these creameries.
When it is borne in mind that there
were only three gathering stations in
the Territories last year, it will be seen that
Prof. Robertson is doing good work.

LICENSING FOR BEISING.
The Minister of Marine and Fisheries
has decided to permit the issue of
licenses for selling and distributing
beer, wine and spirits in the
Territories. Some time ago
Hon. Commissioner Tilton,
State of Vermont, visited Ottawa
to urge uniform action by Canada and
the States of New York and New Jersey,
so that no license be issued. Commissioner
Tilton must needs begin at
home, as the State of New York
has already issued licenses.

Mr. Meigs, M.P., was here to-day and
pointed out the facts to the Minister,
with the result that the Minister had
also decided to allow licensing.

THE BANK NOTE CONTRACT.
With reference to the contract for
the printing of the new bank notes,
the Finance Department with the
American Bank Note Company for the
printing of bank notes, stamps, etc., is
rumored on the street that an order-in-
Council has been passed authorizing
modifications in the terms of the
contract upon which tenders
were invited.

OUR MINERAL PRODUCTION.
A summary of the production of
Canada last year was issued by the
Geological Survey to-day. The total
value being placed at \$2,167,000, as
against \$2,000,000 in 1910. The value
of the metal is given at \$8,039,640, made
up as follows: Gold, \$2,477,580; silver,
\$2,283,306; iron, \$8,200,000; nickel, \$1,842,513;
lead (fine in ore), \$1,000,000; zinc,
\$1,213,841; nickel (fine in ore), 3-
500,000 pounds; \$1,155,000; silver (fine in
ore), \$2,302,345; copper, \$2,147,580;
total metallic, \$8,039,640. The value of
iron ore, \$1,000,000; zinc, \$1,213,841;
nickel (fine in ore), \$1,213,841; nickel
\$8,039,640, and petroleum, \$2,167,000.

The official statistical statement
shows increases in the production of
copper, gold, nickel, and silver,
while the output of iron ore, natural
gas (\$75,500) and nickel, has fallen
off. The production of coal has
increased in all the provinces with
the exception of Ontario. The
exception is directly due to the
closure of the blast furnace at Hamilton,
Ont., the company obtaining all the
Canadian ore smelted from that pro-
vince.

The production of lead is altogether
that of British Columbia, and has in-
creased in the year by over 1,000,000
lbs., but a decrease in the price of
some 8 per cent. lessens the
total value by \$25,825.
