THEY WILL DO IT.

More Patrons Fined for Tampering
With Milk.

Inspector Millar, of the Western
Dairymen's Association, recently visit-
ed the Elmira and Dennington fac-
tories, and had the following patrons
punished for tampering with milk sup-
plied to the above factories:

At Elmira—Killean Schmitt was fined
\$15 and costs; Charles W. Womack,
and costs, and John Bohlander, \$5 and
costs. Each one pleaded guilty to the
charge of supplying milk to the El-
mira cheese factory from which the
cream had been removed.

Before Squire Thorne, of Embro, Ira
Hummason, a patron of the Denning-
ton factory, pleaded guilty to the
charge of supplying milk from which
the cream had been taken, and was
fined \$10 and \$1 costs.

The season for this year is about
over, and it is hoped that unscrupu-
lous patrons of cheese factories who
may be inclined to tamper with
milk, to be careful, as the Inspector is
liable to be called in at any moment
if there is the least room for suspicion.
It is not the pleasantest task in the
world to prosecute patrons of cheese
factories for tampering with milk, and
the association would be quite willing
to devote its energies, expended in this
direction, to some other line of work;
but so long as there are to be found
here and there dishonest patrons, it
must be the duty of some organization
to look after the public interest.

Mr. Millar is now engaged visiting
the factories in the northern section,
and giving instruction to the makers
in curing cheese.

The experience of the season just
about closed shows that a great many
patrons of cheese factories need in-
struction in the curing of milk sup-
plied to the factories. During the fall
and winter months the association
makes a special effort in providing
instruction of this kind at the annual
meetings of the cheese factories and
local meetings. The secretary of the
association is open for work of this
kind, and will arrange to attend as
many meetings of cheese factories and
creameries as his time will al-
low during the coming winter. The
only charge for his services will be his
necessary travelling expenses, or a suf-
ficient number of members' fees to
cover them.

"The Good Old Times."

Rev. Dr. Hunter Has Optimistic
Views.

Interesting Lecture at Knox Church—
The First of a Course.

A highly pleased audience were pres-
ent at Knox Church, South Islington,
last night, and one source of delight
was the beautiful appearance the in-
terior of the church now presents. The
occasion was the first of a course of
lectures which it is proposed to hold
this winter in connection with the
Bible class of the church, and it was
a very encouraging beginning. The
audience was large, and the intellec-
tual treat afforded was such that those
present will eagerly await the next
of the series. Rev. J. G. Stuart, pastor
of the church, presided as chairman.

The lecturer of the evening, Rev. Dr.
Hunter, of Eskine Church, Toronto,
spoke of "The Good Old Times." He
was very eloquent, and the lecture
contained much interesting infor-
mation. Many of his points he illus-
trated with amusing stories. He spoke
of the universal existence of that class
of people who long for "the good old
times." People who do not see the
good features of the present and forget
the bad features of the past. "Crumb-
ing," he said, was as old as man. A
sufficient cause for the bad or good
times of a country was the grumbling
or not grumbling of the people gener-
ally. "We are living today," he said,
"in the golden flush and time of a
bright morning which indicates the
oncoming of a glorious and happy
future." In the property of the
people of a country one must consider its
material wealth. If prosperous in that
respect, lifted up to a higher grade
higher grade socially, and that social
life leads them out to a brighter and
better life spiritually. The masses of
the people were never better clothed
and fed than at the present time.

Continuing, the lecturer compared
the condition of the people in the
present generation, the speaker thought
the advancement along the lines of
agriculture, light transportation,
communication, and in this connection
he said it had taken 70 hours for the
news of the battle of Waterloo to reach
London, and six weeks to come to
America, and six months to go to
Calcutta, while the discharge of the
hanging was flashed across the wires
from Woodstock to England in 75 sec-
onds. Referring to the cables, he said
150,000 miles of copper wire had been
laid, binding together the nations of
the earth much better than the form-
ing of treaties.

He spoke at considerable length of
the beneficial influence of the press.
"If a man has a Bible, a dictionary
and a good newspaper," said the
speaker, "he has enough to fit him
for this world and the life to come."
The educational institutions were an-
other mark of advancement. It had
been claimed that the education of
the working classes led to strikes, but
while strikes might be a curse to the
present generation, the speaker thought
they would be a blessing to the fu-
ture. Intelligence was making itself
felt in the community. The world was
growing better in point of generosity,
which was higher than education.
Men were learning to spend their
wealth for the uplifting of society. In
conclusion, he spoke of the advance-
ment in the church; the tendency was
not to erect greater barriers between
the denominations, but to break them
down. Dr. Hunter illustrated many of
his points with humorous stories.

Rev. W. J. Clark was then called
upon by the chairman for an address.
Mr. Clark stated that he was in sym-
pathy with Dr. Hunter, and believed
the world to be growing better, but
thought a good case could be made
out from the other standpoint, and
while admitting that he did not speak
from conviction, attacked the doctor's
arguments very wittily.

Dr. Millikan, of Toronto, followed in
a very able address, in which he point-
ed out the prevalent evils of the day.
The music was led by the church
choir.

GONE TO REST.

Death of a Veteran British Soldier in
London.

The Advertiser is requested to pub-
lish the following sketch of a veteran
soldier, who has recently passed away:
"There died at Chicago last week
another hero, in the person of Mr.
John H. Johnson, formerly of the
Prince Consort's Own Rifle Brigade. Mr.
Johnson served in the Kaffir war at
the Cape of Good Hope in 1848. Short-
ly after returning from the Cape of
Good Hope his regiment embarked for
the Crimea and landed there in July,
1854. He served through the campaign
as a handman until peace was pro-
claimed. The regiment returned in
1856 to Dover, and thence went to Al-
dershot; thence to Edinburgh and
Glasgow; then to Newcastle and
Portsmouth; then to Dublin, and from
Dublin to America at the time of the
Front affair, when the "Alabama"
claim was settled.

In Canada Mr. Johnson served in
the militia, under Lord Alexander Rus-
sell. Afterwards he served in King-
ston, Montreal and Quebec, and at the
latter place received his discharge. He
was in possession of the Crimean and
Turkish medals, and four clasps for
the battles of Alma, Inkerman, Bal-
aklava and Sebastopol; also a medal for
long service and good conduct, and
a medal for the Kaffir war at the
Cape of Good Hope.

Mr. Johnson was a valued employe
of the Great Western and Grand
Trunk railways for 35 years. For
the past twenty years he had
been a resident of Queen's avenue.
In politics Mr. Johnson was a staunch
Reformer, and in religion a faithful
member of the Roman Catholic
Church. He was a true-hearted Irish-
man. He leaves a widow, but no
family."

ANNA EVA FAYS DEVIL.

too true is the works of the demon
possessed people today, and yet men
and women, church members in many
instances, will be deceived into the

query so pointedly answered by God
in his Word.

those that used curious arts and

IN OUR OIL FIELDS.

Much Drilling and Some Good Strikes
Made.

Perhaps never in the history of the
Canadian petroleum trade have devel-
opment operations been so active in so
many directions as they are at pre-
sent, says the Petroleum Topic. No
only is every nook and cranny of the
recognized oil belts being explored
for the greasy fluid, but rigs from
Petrolia and Oil Springs are "wild-
catting" in many quarters hunting for
fresh fields. The causes for this
unprecedented activity are three-
fold—the gradual falling off of the
production of the older territories, the
ever-increasing demand for petroleum
and its products, and lastly, the good
price which oil commands and is like-
ly to for a long period.

A large number of new wells have
been put down around Petrolia. Per-
haps the most notable of these is a
well finished during the latter part of
September by Mr. R. Lawver, on the
property behind his house—virgin ter-
ritory to the drill. His first venture
brought a nice producer, good for 4 or
5 barrels. He then moved his rig east
and put down another and struck a
very fine well, with large quantities of
gas. This started pumping a lot of
oil and, as far as we can gather, has
been producing about 25 barrels per
day ever since, the rig being run
mainly by gas. In all probability, Mr.
Lawver will continue to drill over this
farm. Mr. A. C. Edward is also drill-
ing on his property immediately east
of Mr. Lawver's. Wells are also be-
ing drilled at Wallaceburg, Leamington,
Bothwell, and on Pelee Island.
