BAKER WILL DECIDE TODAY ON STATUS OF BASEBALL PLAYERS

Crowder Lays Recommendations, Which Baker Will Now Consider.

WASHINGTON, July 24.—Secretary Baker late today postponed until tomorrow his decision on extending the effective time of the work or fight regulations as they apply to professional baseball players.

Proctor Mack Crowder was ready to lay his recommendations before the secretary after receiving a brief from the National Baseball Commission, but the secretary was unable, because of the press of more important matters, to take up the matter. The war secretary said he would consider the brief and Gen. Crowder's recommendations tonight, and expected to announce his decision in the morning.

MILITARY FIELD DAY ATTRACTS THOUSANDS ALL OVER DISTRICT

Most Successful Athletic Program Run Off Without Hitch at Carling Heights Yesterday—Serge-Major Pontin Winner of Many Events—Burlesque and Novel Stunt Races Delight Large Crowd.

Carling Heights yesterday afternoon was the mecca for practically every soldier in Western Ontario with his friends when the grand military athletic field sports were run off in approval of fashion. There were about 6,000 people in attendance, the camp being thrown open to the public at 1 p.m. Old Sol smiled sweetly on the parade ground where the various events were held, and there was not a hitch in the lengthy program, nor an accident to mar the success of the outing. Athletic field days have been held under the auspices of the military authorities annually since the outbreak of hostilities, but yesterday's affair surpassed all previous meets, which is no doubt due to the unlimited energy displayed by Major C. O. Fairbank and his sports committee representative of each unit in camp here.

There was fun for everybody, particularly the youngsters, the starting line made the contestants in the various events work hard to win. There were thirty events on the program, all of which were amusing. The spirit of good comradeship between officers and men was manifested by the large number of the former entering the various events. There was no distinction made between officers and volunteers in fact it was noted that the majority of the prizes were picked off by the men called up for service demonstrating that Canada will soon have many more clear cut types of manhood on her fighting line.

Competition Keen. There were many visitors from Western Ontario at camp yesterday, and mothers, wives, sisters and sweethearts joyously clapped their hands and cheered as their heroes romped across the tape as victors. Competition was keen, there being many entries in each event. The judges in the baby show had a very difficult task picking the prize winners. However, each child of a soldier in the baby show had a prize, and everyone was satisfied with the decisions made by Brig-General L. W. Shannon, who being a bachelor, was neutral.

There were events for soldiers' wives, and each returned man presented the mistress of his house along to take part. The 5-mile race substituted owing to disagreeable running conditions. The nursing sisters joined in the fun and entered the many events allotted to them. The 50-yard race for officers over 40 years of age was a spirited event, Major Emmerton, munkey officer, walking off with the spoils.
