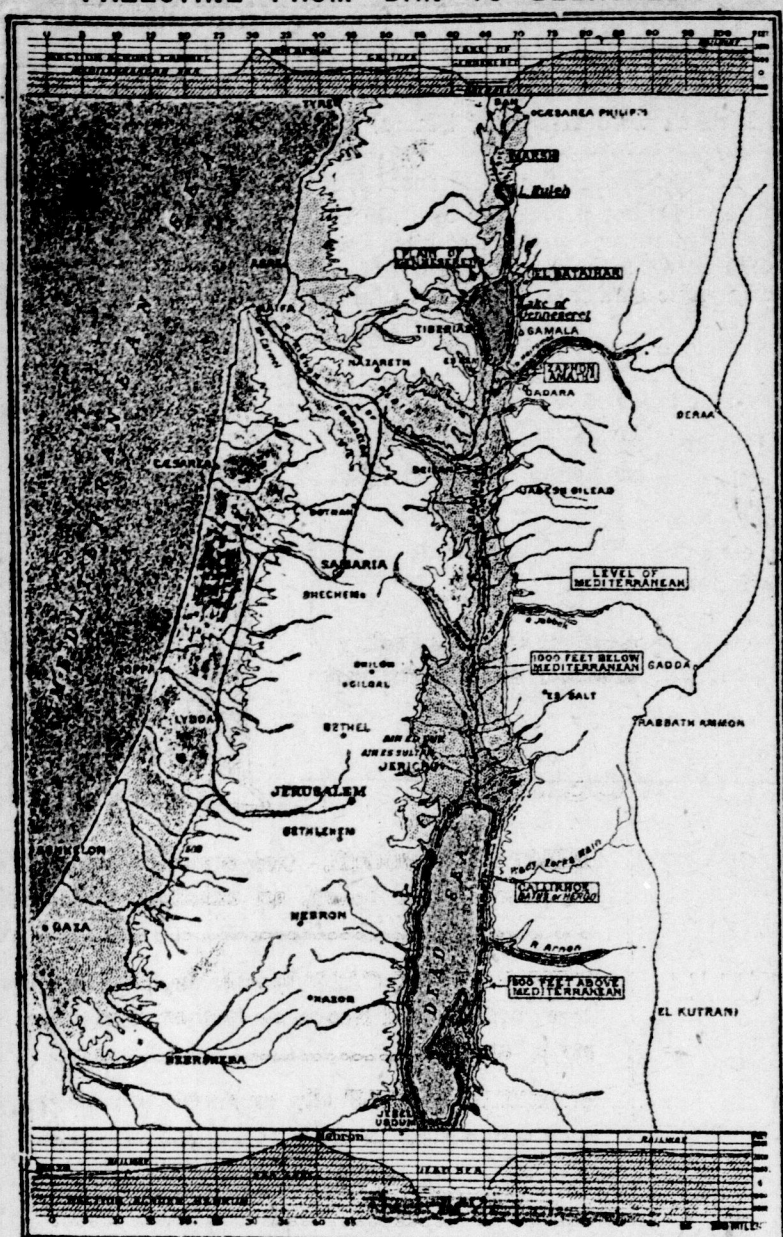


PALESTINE FROM DAN TO BEERSHEBA

GALT NURSE DEAD; WAS SERVING IN BOULOGNE HOSPITAL

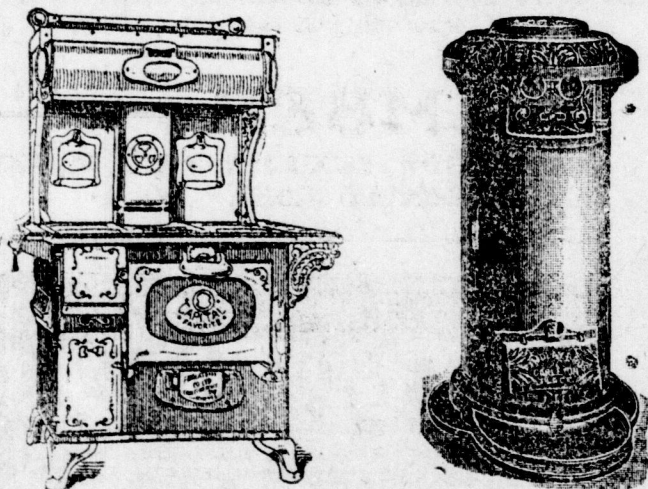
GALT, Nov. 7.—The sad news was received this morning that Nursing Sister Evelyn V. McKay had died in the base hospital at Boulogne on November 4 from pleuro-pneumonia. Deceased, who was 26 years of age, was born in Galt, and was the youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. S. McKay. She trained for a nurse at Grace Hospital, Toronto, and enlisted in 1915. She spent a year in the base hospital and Exhibition Camp, Toronto, going overseas in December, 1916. After six months in England she went to No. 3 Canadian General Hospital at Boulogne, where she remained until her death. She was an exceptionally popular young lady, and is survived by her parents, three brothers, Dr. W. M. McKay, Lieut. M.

DEPENDENTS OF SOLDIERS DRAW A HIGHER CHECK

Order-in-Council Increases Allowances by \$5.

OTTAWA, Nov. 7.—An order-in-council has been issued increasing the rates of separation allowance payable to the dependents of private soldiers, non-commissioned officers, first class warrant officers and lieutenants, serving with the Canadian Expeditionary Forces, effective September 1, 1918, as follows:

1. Dependents of private soldiers and non-commissioned officers from \$25 to \$30 per month.
2. Dependents of first class warrant officers from \$30 to \$35 per month.
3. Dependents of lieutenants from \$30 to \$40 per month.

As the majority of the November checks had already been printed before the order-in-council was passed, it is not possible to include the adjustment of this month's issue, but the amount due on account of these increased rates for September, October and November will be included in the issue of December checks.

The distribution of December checks will be made from militia headquarters as well as by unit paymasters, by the 15th of December.

Where the dependents of a soldier are receiving their separation allowance from the unit paymaster instead of from Ottawa, the adjustment will be made by the unit paymaster and not from Ottawa.

PREMIER IS TAKING QUITE A GANG TO PEACE CONFERENCE

OTTAWA, Nov. 7.—It is understood that the prime minister will leave at an early date for England to take a part in the preliminary discussions respecting the terms of peace and to represent Canada in connection with the peace conference. He will have the assistance and advice of Sir George Foster, minister of trade and commerce, and the Hon. Arthur Sifton, minister of customs, who accompany him; and at a later date, as soon as urgent duties permit, Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, will proceed to England for the same purpose.

Lloyd Harris, chairman of the Canadian war mission at Washington; Frank Jones, vice-chairman of the war trade board; Dr. James W. Robertson, C.M.G., representing the department of agriculture; and Col. O. M. Biggar of the department of militia and defence, and L. C. Christie of the department of external affairs will also accompany and assist the prime minister in his mission.

The prime minister and the minister of labor have conferred with the president of the Trades and Labor Congress with regard to the selection of a labor representative to accompany the prime minister, and P. M. Draper, secretary of the Trades and Labor Congress, has been selected for the purpose.

During Sir Robert Borden's absence Sir Thomas White will be acting prime minister.

CITIZENS URGED TO HELP PAY FOR WAR

Mayor and Others Address Large Crowds at St. Thomas.

ST. THOMAS, Nov. 7.—"Victory is ours and while the sacrifice has been great and hard to bear at times it has been worth while for we have gained freedom of the world. Thus spoke Mayor Horton in a stirring oration delivered from an automobile in front of the city hall to many thousands of people who gathered tonight in connection with the parade to boost the Victory Loan.

The mayor was received with the most enthusiastic cheering and hand-clapping and when in speaking of the great and noble sacrifice of the Canadian people, he mentioned the fact that he had only recently lost his eldest son, a boy who was not afraid of death and who shared in the great battle for freedom and democracy.

Rev. N. H. McMillan, who was with the mayor, and who had followed the big parade around the city, was then called on for an address. He urged his hearers to give thanks to the Almighty, for he was responsible for the great Victory Loan. He urged his hearers to assist now in the work of financing the end of the war. Victory, he said, is the child of sacrifice, and a very bitter sacrifice it has been. Old Kaiser Bill, however, will never again sleep the sleep of peace.

The parade started at 7:30 at the Horton market and proceeded west on Talbot street. While the parade was proceeding His Hon. Judge C. W. Colter stepped on the balcony of the city hall and delivered a stirring address to the great value of Victory bonds as an investment.

FIRE WAGON COLLAPSED.
ST. THOMAS, Nov. 7.—During the celebration and parade on the main street last night one accident was reported. The fire wagon, carrying the ladders and other equipment, was brought out into the parade, and after making several rounds of the city, the driver attempted to turn around at the city hall. One of the front wheels caught in the street railway track, and the wagon collapsed.

SHORT IN COLLECTIONS.
ST. THOMAS, Nov. 7.—A well-known young local lad appeared in the city police court this morning charged with funds collected for the St. Thomas Steam Laundry for his own use. He acknowledged a heavy shortage. Magistrate Maxwell decided that on account of the boy's youth he would call on his father, and adjourned the case until Friday.

LIFT BAN SATURDAY.
GODERICH, Nov. 7.—The board of health this morning decided to lift the ban in connection with the influenza outbreak on Saturday at midnight. The churches will be open on Sunday, and schools and other places on Monday. The situation is considerably improved and new cases seem to be of a milder type.

GOING WELL IN KENT.
CHATHAM, Nov. 7.—The Victory Loan campaign is going strong in Kent County. Yesterday \$126,700 was subscribed, bringing the total for the county to \$1,224,500. The International Harvester Company employees are subscribing to a man, and when the canvass is completed at the plant, which will be tonight, it is confidently expected every department will have a 100 per cent card.

CALGARY EX-M.P. TO SUCCEED MR. SCOTT ON RAILWAY BOARD

OTTAWA, Nov. 7.—Outstanding vacancies on the Dominion Railway Board have been filled today. Simon J. McLean, whose term expired some time ago, after ten years' service on the commission has been reappointed and will continue as the board's expert on transportation problems. J. M. Rutherford of Calgary, ex-M. P. and formerly live stock commissioner for the Dominion, but more recently connected with the Canadian Pacific irrigation work in the west, has been appointed to the vacancy created by the expiry of the ten-year term of Mr. Scott, who has not been reappointed. The position of assistant chief commissioner was formerly held by Mr. Scott. Nobody has yet been designated for the post. Commissioner McLean is for the present barred from taking the post, as the railway act requires that both the chief commissioner and the assistant shall be lawyers of different standing. An amendment to the act will probably be provided. The prairie provinces have had no former representation on the board. Dr. Rutherford will now provide such representation.

PERTH ADVANCES STEADILY.
STRATFORD, Nov. 7.—Today the Victory Loan total reached \$1,314,750, an increase from yesterday of \$122,450. The amounts credited to the different centres follow:

St. Marys \$172,350, Listowel \$80,550, Wallace \$23,200, Elms \$63,500, Morningside and Milverton \$65,200, Logan \$24,100, Ellice \$32,450, North Easthope \$17,050, Hibernia \$22,600, Mitchell and Fullarton \$116,650, Downie \$68,500, South Easthope \$19,750, Blanshard \$45,050, Stratford \$502,600, grand total \$1,314,750.

BRANTFORD BOY IS HERO.

BRANTFORD, Nov. 7.—For his work in keeping communications intact during a very heavy fire, Signaller Fred McDougall, a former well-known O.H.A. player in this city, has been decorated with the Military Medal.

Lieut. Jack Orr, who went overseas with the 1st Brants, was today reported as dangerously wounded. Lieut. Orr won the Military Cross some time ago for gallant work in the field with the 54th Battalion. Pte. Andrew Duncan was reported as wounded and missing, and J. T. Edwards as wounded. Pte. Duncan went overseas with the C. O. R. last January.

DROVE INTO CATTLE.

ST. THOMAS, Nov. 7.—Although no arrests have been made up till a late hour tonight the police have the description of both the car and the occupants of an automobile that drove into a herd of cows just northeast of the city last night. The farmer states that he was taking his cows to their usual watering place when the car approached. Without waiting for the animals to move he drove through them and injured one animal so badly that he was compelled afterwards to kill it.

SARNIA "OVER TOP."

SARNIA, Nov. 7.—Sarnia has gone "over the top" in the Victory Loan campaign. The objective was \$700,000, and when the returns were tabulated last night the city had gone above that by \$23,000. The honor flag is now on the way from Toronto, and as soon as it is received it will be hoisted at the Victory Loan headquarters. The latest returns as given out by the Victory Loan committee show that the county of Lambton has subscribed \$2,273,650. The objective for the county is \$2,500,000. Petrolia is a close second, with Enniskillen Township behind her, and it is likely that when the next returns are in that that district will also have won its honor flag.

WOODSLEE TO BE OPEN.

WOODSLEE, Nov. 7.—In connection with the million-dollar missionary fund of the Methodist Church, Rev. C. L. Couzens was in London Thursday attending the conference missionary committee. The churches and schools will reopen next Sunday.
