CANADIAN LIVE STOCK AWARDED PRIZES AT CHICAGO EXHIBITION


CHICAGO, Dec. 2.—Canadian exhibitors at the international livestock show, now being held here, were awarded the following prizes in today's livestone.

DRAMATIC INCIDENT **FEATURES WINNIPEG CONSPIRACY TRIAL**

Judge Calls For Sheriff To Expel Lawyer Who Ignores Ruling.

WINNIPEG, Man., Dec. 2 .- A dramatic incident featured the trial of R. B. Russell, charged with seditious conspiracy, tonight when Mr. Justice Metcalfe, exasperated because Robert Cassidy, K.C., Vancouver, ignored a ruling which had been made by his lordship. called for the sheriff and then a bailiff to have the senior counsel for the defence removed from the courtroom. On at least two occasions his lordship ruled that the evidence was permissible, and that Mr. Cassidy would get his chance in due course to read as much from the strike bulletin as he wished.




