A PATRIOT'S ACT. ASSASSIN'S DEFENCE. Murderer of Col. Wyllie Gives Agitator's Stock Excuses for His Terrible Deed.

LONDON, July 11.—Madar Lal Dhinagrat, the Indian student who shot and killed Sir Curzon Wyllie on the night of July 1 at the reception of the Imperial Indian army, who also killed Dr. Malcom in "self defence," was again arraigned in the Westminster Police Court Saturday.

JUSTICE OF IT. "I don't wish to say anything in my defence," he simply to prove the justice of my deed. As for myself, I don't think any English law court has any authority to arrest me and send me to prison or to pass a sentence of death upon me.
