VILLA'S SURRENDER WAS UNCONDITIONAL

Mexican Bandit Pleaded for Life and is Given Protection.

Mexico City, July 29. — Francisco Villa, civilian, divested of all titles and authority, is now on his way to the ranch of his erstwhile comrade in arms, General Thomas Urbina, near Nievas, Zacatecas, to take up his residence, according to the terms of his agreement with the De la Huerta gov-

Walking arm in arm with General Eugenio Martinez around the public plaza in Sabinas, Coahuila, Villa agreed to the most drastic terms ever imposed on any Mexican revolutionist, asking only that his life be protected, and that his men be allowed to resume their positions in civil life.

"I am surrendering unconditionally because the country needs peace for because the country needs peace for reconstruction," Villa said when he met General Martinez at the railroad station in Sabinas. When General Mtrtinez arrived at the station, Villa

greeted him cordially.
Feared For His Life. played the greatest caution. He show-ed that he actually feared for his life, but was greatly pleased at the pre-cautions taken to safeguard him. Al-tho frequently thrusting his hand gun-

being always reassured by Martinez.

The government agreed to pay Villa's men enough to enable them to return to civil occupations, so they would not have an excuse later that they were forced to resume brigandage in order to live. Villa was given his choice of several places of residence, at one of which he was to dence, at one of which he was to agree to live. The ranch near Nievas was finally selected.

Villa desired to make the trip to Torreon overland with his men, al-tho this meant a three-days' march over the desert. The former bandit chief evidently desired to keep his 600 men with him as long as possible. He is under agreement to disband the troops at Torreon. It finally was decided that Villa was to go by train, but the men would proceed to Torreon on foot. Two trains were offered Villa, men but they refused to use Villa's men, but they refused to use

One theory that was advanced was that Villa perhaps had bullion or coin buried somewhere between Sabinas and Nievas and desired a charce to

exhume the treasure.

In view of the evident fear of Villa that an attempt might be made on his life, a high government official announced that every protection would be given the former rebel leader, regardless of the numerous crimes he

had committed.

Committed Gross Crimes.

'Should anything happen to Villa this government would be accused of conniving at his assassination." the official said. "The greater the crimes charged against the man the greater would be the evidence of bad faith. Villa is now a government protege."

It was said that there are several officers in Mexico City whose ears have been cut off by Villa, and that


