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## PROVIDE INSPECTION OF LOAN COMPANIES

Enabling Bill Introduced in Com-mons by Minister of

WILL BE MADE ANNUALLY

Ottawa, March 30.—(By Canadian Press.)—At the opening of the house of commons this afternoon Sir Henry Drayton introduced two bills, the first Drayton introduced two bills, the first to amend the trust companies act, and the second to amend the loan companies act. The minister explained that the object of these two bills was to provide for annual inspection of trust and loan companies.

### **SAYS \$18,000 IN BANK BELONGS TO ORIGINALS**

Col. Cooper Makes Appeal for Liberality on Tag Day.

The regular meeting of the Daughters of Canada was held last evening in the Central "Y," the principal business being the appeal by Col. Cooper for the assistance of the members of the organization on the tag day for the benefit of the returned "Originals," to be held on 22nd April next. The meeting unanimously agreed to do everything in their power to ensure success of the project.

Col. Cooper briefly told the meeting the claim the "Originals" had on the people of Toronto, of their prowess on the field of battle and of the large number who returned maimed. Their organization was, he said, between 600 and 700 strong, and they had started a subscription aimed to average \$25 each for the purpose of building a commemoration hall, which they purpose naming St. Julien Hall.

G. T.
