They claim that each branch should send in individual reports to the de-partment. The board of control have decided to recommend that their request be granted.

Railway Receipts Increase \$10,000

City's Percentag for Last Month Shows Big Increase Over Feb., 1911 -Has Doubled In Five Years.

becording to the statement of the ity treasurer on Saturday monning, the city's percentage of the street railing company's receipts for last company's receipts for last month amounted to \$55,992,82. This is an in-crease of over \$10,000 over February last year, when the figures were \$45, 039.85. Last month's percentages also represent double the amount paid to the oity in 1907, and thus the city's reve-nue from this source has doubled in the last five years.


