LAMBETH.—Although we have not been visited with any special outpouring of the Holy Spirit, yet we have had many evidences of God's presence with us, in the means of grace, and seventeen souls have been gathered into the fold of Christ. Nevertheless, we have to report a decrease, chiefly arising from removals. Unity and peace obtains in all our borders, and a good spirit of hearing is seen in our congregations. As a Church, we are not very numerous or strong in this Mission, but we are united in affection, prayer, and effort to sustain and extend the cause of the Redeemer. We feel, however, the need of more "power from on high," to render more effectual the efforts put forth, and our prayer is,

"Come, Holy Spirit, heavenly dove,
With all thy quickening powers,
Come shed abroad a Saviour's love,
And this shall kindle ours."

Then shall Jacob arise and do valiantly for the Lord of Hosts, though "he is small."

INGERSOLL.—The congregation is somewhat fluctuating. The Sabbath School is a very pleasing part of our work. We have an excellent Superintendent, united and diligent teachers. Considering the hard times, we have done well in financial matters, having raised for all purposes, \$438.43.

PUTNAMVILLE.—We are living together in peace; our congregations are good, and the preaching services are often enriched with the Divine presence.

TALBOTVILLE.—At Talbotville, our membership has slightly increased. The Sabbath School is doing a good work. The Church debt has been diminished by about \$200. At Front Street, the Master has been pleased graciously to smile upon our efforts to win souls. A Society of 13 members has been formed, and others are manifesting a desire to flee from the wrath to come. The friends determined to arise and build; a brick church, 28x40, is in course of erection, towards which \$500 are promised.

ST. THOMAS.—Our S. S. has grown considerably, and the congregations have largely increased; our Missionary contributions have exceeded those of any former year in our history. Twelve persons have been received as members, and sixteen are on trial. Our Class and Prayer Meetings, on the whole, have
