JUDGMENT IN THE NEVINS WILL CASE

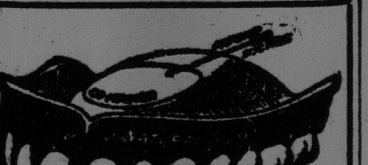
Finding in Favor of Contestants—Genuineness of the Contested Will Not Established.

In the Probate Court yesterday afternoon Judge H. O. McInerney gave judgment in the matter of the contested will of Charles Nevins. His Honor found for the contestants on the ground that it was necessary for the proponents to prove the genuineness of the documents purporting to be the last will and testament of Charles Nevins and in his opinion, they had failed to do this.

The case has excited much interest locally. According to the evidence given no will could be found immediately following the death of Mr. Nevins, but one, purporting to be his last will and testament, was found in the safe of the drug store of Howard Mowatt at the corner of Haymarket square and Waterloo street. The safe was alleged by the proponents of the will to be the property of Mr. Nevins. Mowatt, one of the witnesses to the document, was a beneficiary under the will as was also Francis Kerr, the solicitor who drew up the will. The other witness was George Cox, a partner of Mowatt's. In the absence of a will practically the whole property would go to Mr. Nevins' sister. Handwriting experts were produced by both sides to prove or disprove Mr. Nevins' signature and it was brought out in evidence that the expert testifying for the proponents of the will was given a \$20 bill by Miss Smith, she having received it from Mr. Mowatt.

In reviewing the evidence, Judge McInerney said that the testimony furnished by the proponents of the will, in his opinion was certainly not sufficient to establish its authenticity, but he would not say that it was sufficient to establish that the will was a forgery. It was possible that there might be further evidence adduced at a later date which might be sufficient to prove that the will was genuine.

He felt, however, that circumstances in connection with the finding of the will; the fact that one of the witnesses to the will was a beneficiary under the will; the fact that the signature to the will was written as if it were an "X" in the numerous other genuine signatures which had been submitted in evidence; the fact that the

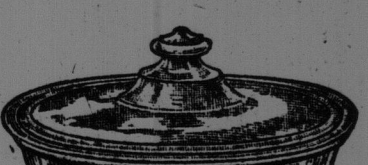

date of the will had been inserted, not at the time of the making of the will, but had been written in properly, and no testimony had been given as to when it had been inserted; all these things raised grave doubts as to the genuineness of the documents, so that in his opinion those propounding the will had not proven it to the satisfaction of the court.

He referred to Miss Smith's testimony that she and the deceased were to get married, as, to say the least, it was a very peculiar place for a wedding ring—attached to a document which was not to be produced until after the death of the testator. The question of the safe, in which nothing had been found but the will and the ring, was also peculiar circumstances as was the fact that a locksmith was engaged to open it when Miss Smith knew several people who knew the combination and which she, herself, admitted that she remembered at times. Why should Mr. Nevins have a safety deposit box when he possessed such a

safe? The casual way in which the will had been executed, he thought also a suspicious circumstance, as nothing had been pre-arranged but the testator, witnesses, and solicitor had all seemed to meet by chance.

LADY ASTOR SAYS

BREWERS' CRY GOT

NO RESPONSE

Declares Result Shows Plymouth Conservatives "Not in Their Pocket."

Plymouth, Nov. 21—Lady Astor, successful in her fight for re-election to the House of Commons from the Sutton Division of Plymouth, declared in a talk with an Associated Press representative:

"I knew the battle was won before it started. You can't throw a moral challenge to Plymouth and not get a reply. The reactionaries forget that this is 1922, not 1912. They have a lot to learn and a few more Dr. Bayliss will 'learn 'em'."

"I represent," continued Lady Astor, "what the average man or woman wants—social reforms in a sane manner. Plymouth always has been my Virginia in England, and I could not say more of any place. The anti-American cry which is being used by the brewers all over England got no response here. I don't believe you can fight for what is highest and best without getting a response, especially if people feel that you mean it in your heart."

"Mine is a victory for Plymouth not for myself. I am deeply grateful for the courageous stand the Liberals have taken, and the steadfastness of

the overwhelming mass of Conservatives will show England that they are not in the brewers' pockets."

"I appreciate the workingman's and workingwoman's confidence in me. It is high honor to represent Plymouth and above all to fight for the children whose voices have cheered me on for twelve years."
