SYDNEY BONDS FOR \$235,000 PURCHASED BY A TORONTO FIRM

HALIFAX HEARS OF LARGE VESSEL AFIRE AT SEA

ARABS ATTACK HEBREWS IN JERUSALEM

Five Persons Killed and 13 Wounded in Disorders—A Bomb Thrown.

Jerusalem, Nov. 3.—Five persons were killed and thirteen others were wounded in disorders here today which included the throwing of a bomb. The trouble, the police report, originated in an attempted attack by Arab rioters on the Jewish quarters.

BANK OF ENGLAND RATE DOWN AGAIN

Reduction to Five Per Cent Announced Today.

OF Great Interest in Financial Circles as Indicating Situation in Canada—At Outbreak of War it Jumped to 10 Per Cent.

(Canadian Press Cable.) London, Nov. 3.—The Bank of England reduced its rate of discount to five per cent from five and one-half per cent this morning. On July 21 last the rate was cut from six per cent to five and one-half.
