The elongated ex-plasterer, according to a communication received in this city yesterday, plans to discuss terms with Rickard for a heavyweight title bout proposed for July 4 at Boyle's Thirty Acres, Jersey City.

Rickard declared at his office that he had not heard from Fulton, and added that he had not been in communication with the Minnesota heavyweight.
