### ATHLETIC.

#### To Meet on May 27.

A dual athletic meet will be held between the Y. M. C. A. Business Boys and the St. John High School on Saturday, May 27, commencing at 2:30 p. m. The meet will be held in the grounds of the High School and the Y. M. C. A., using the new Y. M. C. A. track.  
The following events will be run off: 100 yards dash, 220 yards dash, 440 yards dash, one-mile run, 120 yards hurdles, running high jump, running broad jump, pole vault, twelve-unders shot-put, half-mile walk.  
There are no prizes; the boys are in for the love of the game. Points will be awarded as follows: Five points to a winner, three points to second, and one point to third place.

#### A Cheerful Scene.

The grounds adjoining the Y. M. C. A. and High School on Chipman Hill presented a lively appearance on Monday afternoon. They resembled a community playground, with the Commercial up track team working out on the w. Y. M. C. A. running track; High school athletes practicing the pole vault, running broad jump, running high jump, shot-put and distance races; individual members of the Y. M. C. A. track team sitting in shape for the coming athletic meets.  
There was an interested group of spectators, and incidentally they all looked on the game, too. Although the ymnastium season has closed officially, the boys in the classes still use their scheduled hour, after on fine days they file out onto the running track and take advantage of the fresh air and the facilities for keeping fit. A few more of these laydowns are needed in a city the size of St. John.

### WRESTLING.

#### A Long Session.

Chicago, May 17.—A wrestling contest between Martin Pletina of Chicago and Jim Peck of Nebraska was stopped by a referee at 1:30 this morning, after they had wrestled three hours and 22 minutes. Both men were exhausted. The job, billed as a finish bout, was decided by referee Pletina. Much confusion attended the ending of the match. Spectators hurled hats, papers and ribbons into the ring and created an uproar of shouting and stamping.  
Pletina said he was partly blinded after the first fifteen minutes of wrestling when Peck stuck his fingers into his eyes. Ringside spectators said Peck weighed 45 pounds, had the better of the contest. He was more aggressive than Pletina, who escaped from numerous holds by tugging his lighter opponent to the ropes.

#### Feet Greet Carpenter.

Paris, May 17.—Georges Carpentier, world's light heavyweight pugilist, returned to Paris on Sunday from London where he successfully defended his title against "Kid" Lewis. The return of the pugilist was virtually unattended, only a few personal friends were at the hotel to greet him.

**Brennan Knocks Out Tracy.**  
New York, May 16.—Knockout Bill Brennan, of Chicago, knocked out Tracy, of Australia, in the eighth round of their contest tonight in Madison Square Garden. Brennan dropped the all Australian with a series of rights and left to the jaw as they stood in a central corner. Tracy, a long, awkward boxer with little ring form, staved off the heavy punching Chicagoan with long jabs in the early rounds, but went down for a count of eight in the sixth round with a right to the jaw. As he came up, Brennan showed great courage by coming back at Brennan after being hit and making a merry punch exchange for a spell.  
Brennan weighed 195½ and Tracy 187.

**Victory For Gibbons.**  
Winnipeg, May 17.—Mike Gibbons, middleweight, knocked out Danny Fagan, Irish middleweight, in the fifth round of a scheduled twelve-round bout here last night.

**A Tame Bout.**  
Denver, Colo., May 17.—Captain Bob Roger of Chicago, and Fred Fulton of Rochester, Minn., fought twelve rounds here last night to a draw. Neither man was injured, only a few hard blows being struck.

**Technical Knockout.**  
Tulsa, Okla., May 17.—Jack Britton scored a technical knockout over Morris Lux of Kansas City, in the fifth round here last night.

**High Price For Jockey.**  
New York, May 17.—A record price for the services of a jockey in this country was said to have been paid yesterday when J. S. Costen, turfman, paid \$23,000 to James Arthur for the contract on Chick Lang, Lang, who has developed under Arthur's training, has ridden 180 winners in less than two years. 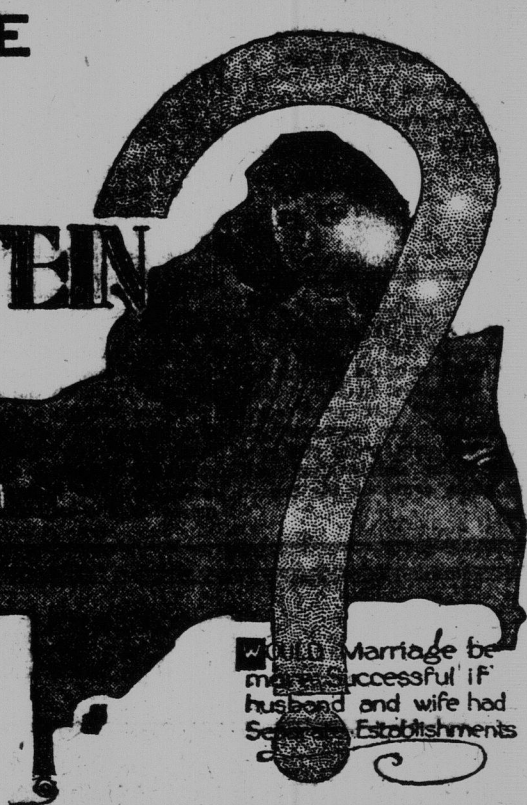

### BEE SPECIALISTS MEET.

Discusses Means of Combating "Isle of Wight" Disease.

Serious ravages, causing almost complete destruction of the beekeeping industry in parts of Europe by the "Isle of Wight" disease, has started determined action by American beekeepers to save their business from similar loss.

Thus far the disease has not gained a foothold in this country or in Canada, and it is believed that should the disease become established here beekeepers, queen breeders and manufacturers of bee supplies would quickly be seriously damaged.

As a first step toward preventing this a meeting was held recently at the Bureau of Entomology of the United States Department of Agriculture, which was attended by specialists from several States and Canada who are interested in protective measures. Among those present were Dr. L. O. Howard, chief of the Bureau of Entomology; Dr. C. L. Marshall, Chairman of the Federal Horticultural Board; Dr. E. P. Phillips, Government agriculturist; Professor F. E. Miller, apilary inspector for Ontario; Canada; Professor George H. Rea, Pennsylvania State College; R. G. Carr, apilary inspector for New Jersey; J. G. Sanders, Harrisburg, Pa., President of the American Association of Economic Entomologists; Professor N. E. Phillips, Massachusetts Agricultural College and

The meeting decided to use all feasible efforts to prevent the introduction of queen bees from all foreign countries except Canada, and to discourage the introduction of adult bees into the United States except for experimental and scientific purposes by the United States Department of Agriculture. Since there is no known case of Wight disease in Canada, and since it is hoped and expected that the Dominion will establish the same safeguards to the beekeeping industry, it is planned not to establish any quarantine or prohibition against shipments of bees from and to Canada.

All the men who attended the meeting were of the opinion that the Isle of Wight would be such a serious menace to beekeeping on this continent that every possible step should be taken to prevent its introduction. All importation of queen bees should be stopped, they believed. Pending full legislation in this matter, the conferees are hopeful that beekeepers in both countries will cooperate to the fullest extent by making no attempt to introduce adult bees. Any queen breeder who introduced this disease into the country would be doing great damage to the beekeeping industry that would be a serious drawback to future business, it was said.

Beekeepers who see any outbreak of any disease of adult bees are urged to send at once samples for examination and diagnosis to the Bureau of Entomology, Washington, D. C. More detailed information concerning the disease may be obtained by writing to the United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C., for copy of Department Circular 218, entitled: "The Occurrence of Disease of Adult Bees," which is available for free distribution.

Isle of Wight disease is caused by a parasite mite in adult bees, and is easily transported by bees shipped from Europe to America, as was proved last summer, when live bees carrying living mites arrived in Washington from Scotland. The disease is evidently a serious source of loss to beekeeping of the British Isles. It was first observed in 1894 in the Isle of Wight, whence came the name, and in succeeding years it has spread with considerable rapidity to all parts of Great Britain. Because of the large losses from the disease reported by British beekeepers, it has been the subject of an investigation by several workers of the United States Department of Agriculture. In England the disease has been called scab disease, from the order name (Acarina) of the mite that causes it.

**FACTS FROM THE "HYDRO."**

But in the other four towns the money value of the reductions is substantial, and at Wallaceburg is equivalent to a dividend on the entire plant investment of more than 25 per cent in six years. All five have accumulated reserves and surplus amounting to 73 per cent, and upward of all obligations, while Ridgeway's surplus alone, without reserves, exceeds liability.
