COAL There will probably athread and thracite coal for domestic use in Canada next winter, said S. J. Cook, chief of the mining, metallurgical and chemical branch of the Dominion bureau of statistics today. The opinion continues:

"Imports into central Ontario of anthracite coal in domestic sizes during the six months ending June, 1922, amounted to 776,000 tons as compared with 1,421, solot tons, the average quantity imported during the same period in the three preceding years. Of the same grades, the province of Quebec received 240,000 tons this year as compared with an average importation of 515,000 tons in the three preceding years.
