WOOL PRICES HIGHER.

Prediction of After-War Slump Not Justified.

Toronto, Feb. 6.-Instead of there having been a slump in wool prices after the war, as had been predicted, prices of both wool and mutton had shown a tendency to strengthen, so President W. A. Dryden of the Canadian Sheep Breed-ers' Association, said in his address at the annual meeting of the association here. Some authorities, he added, pre-dicted that as a result of the wastage which had occurred during the war, prices of wool and mutton could not de-cline for some time to come.

President Dryden said there should not be even an imaginary line between Canada and the United States so far as pure-bred animals were con-cerned. "Breeders on both sides of the line," he said, "should have absolute freedom, both in buying and selling, the contin-ent over."

The association went on record in favor of having all sheep bred in Can-ada and sold as purebreds, registered at American registers, and Canadian breeders buying this stock had had difficulty in securing Canadian registration.

A resolution was passed declaring that millfeeds had been reduced in quality, that the legal definition of feeds was not sufficiently clear, and that many of these feeds contain injurious weeds. It was, therefore, asked that all classes of mil-lifeds be clearly defined and that the enforcement of the law be in the hands of the department of agriculture.

BRADLEY'S CAT DICK KILLED. Palm Beach, Fla., Feb. 6.-John H. Bradley's well-known tom cat, "Dick," got in a fight with a skunk last night and was killed, and was buried today on the beach club property, where he had stood watch for ten years. Mr. Bradley said today he would like to receive suggestions from some of Dick's old friends of a fitting inscription to place on his tombstone. Owing to his beach club connections he is believed to have had many friends in society than any other cat in America.

Hundreds of newspaper stories and photographs of "Dick" have been pub-lished, dating from eight years ago, when his owner, widely known as a hunter of big game, made a bet that no dog could whip him in a fair fight. Among the dogs he cleaned up soon after was a \$5,000 prize bull belonging to Ed-ward H. McLean, and Newport Nipper, belonging to the late Hamilton Carr. "Dick" never lost a fight before, but that he should have been killed by a polecat, his owner, it is gossamer, must have been because he lost his breath before he got started.
