NEW MONCTON FACTORY. Transcript: The new factory building the Maritime Cap Limited, Moncton, now practically complete, and will be used within a week. The new building of concrete construction throughout, is 60x76 feet in size, and has three stories and a basement. The walls are constructed of small concrete blocks which lend a handsome appearance to the finished structure. The basement will be used for storage purposes, and the first floor for offices, stockroom, shipping department, etc. The second floor will contain the cutting and blocking machinery, while the third, or top floor will contain the department which puts the finishing touches on the product of the company. The whole structure will cost in the vicinity of \$10,000.
