NEWPORT WILL COST MORE THAN \$40,000

Extra Grant Recommended by Ferry Committee This Morning—Ready for Service August 12—Increases to Employes

The ferry committee met this morning in the city building, and seemed generally disposed towards the officials, or some of them, engaged in the service, as recommendations for increase of salary were made in several cases. Other matters of interest were also dealt with including the total cost of equipping the new ferry steamer Governor Carleton, making for further sums to complete the work, and the recommendations contained in the report of the engineer.

Ald. Smith presided and those present were Ald. Potts, Elliott, and Kierstead, the common clerk, ferry superintendent, comptroller, and Mayor Prink for a short time. The report of Mr. Waring was read detailing the work already done by his department, and stating that the new boat would be ready for use by August 12. The total cost of the boat to date including the duty of \$5,000 was \$36,335 and a further grant for additional expenditure of \$2,000 was asked for. The repairs on the Western Extension had amounted to \$4,845 and the total expenditure of the department to date was reported to be \$55,612.25. Mr. Waring recommended that the request for an increase in the purchase of steam steering gear, Ald. Elliott moved that it lie on the table. Ald. Potts moved in amendment that it be adopted, and after an interesting discussion in which Ald. Potts contended that the equipment was necessary his amendment carried. It will be three months before the new gear arrives from England, and in the meantime the boat will have to be operated by hand.

The comptroller advised the committee of the danger of expending the appropriation. A misunderstanding was apparent as to the original appropriation whether it was \$35,000 or \$40,000, the difference arising over the question of the \$5,000 duty. The report of the superintendent showed it to be \$35,000, the estimate being \$20,000 purchase price; \$2,000 towage, etc.; \$5,000 repairs at St. John and duty \$5,000, making a total of \$47,000. The misunderstanding perhaps arose over the supposition that the duty would be returned. A motion put by Ald. Kierstead that the common council be asked to authorize additional payment up to \$42,500 inclusive of duty was carried.

An application was presented from the ferry-collectors for an increase of \$10 a month, and on motion of Ald. Potts the request was granted. Ald. Kierstead, however, said he could not approve of the motion unless the same were also considered in the increase, as they did more work than the captains. His motion to carry, Ald. Potts spoke as considerable length on the capability of the ferry superintendent, and moved an increase of \$15 a month in his salary which was carried.

It was decided to ask the council for a grant for the maiden trip of the Governor Carleton when an excursion will be held, at which the Carleton Corps Band will furnish music. The meeting then adjourned.

EARLY CLOSING CASES POSTPONED FOR WEEK

Judge Ritchie intimates That Evidence Given Shows Smith Case is Not Clear—Did Daley Swallow Ten Dollar Bill?

In the police court this morning one drunk was fined \$8 or two months in jail and Fred McAfee, charged with being a common vagrant with no means of support, and also with begging was remanded.

Policemen Linton, and Kaste and Serjt. Kilpatrick told of the prisoner bothering people in the North end and of his loafing in the street. McAfee was remanded to his sanitarium. While in court this morning he kept mumbling to himself, and told one of the policemen that the reason he was not arrested before was because the police let them alone.

Roy McLaren, charged with assaulting Roy McLeod in Carleton on Monday night to have appeared this morning, but failed to show up and his deposit of \$8 was forfeited.

Andrew Hamburg and Jeremiah Daley charged with fighting together in Union street were brought into court and after both had given evidence, the case was further adjourned. Daley was also charged with stealing \$10 from Hamburg but he went on the stand and denied the charge. Hamburg testified that he and Daley were drinking together on the day that they were arrested, and that Daley put his hand in his (Hamburg's) pocket and took \$12 a ten dollar bill and a two dollar bill, and stuffed them in his moose-horn hat.

The witness testified that he put his hand in Daley's mouth but was only able to get the small bill, Daley having swallowed the other one. Hamburg asked to be allowed to go and see the Russian consul and he was allowed to go on condition that he appear in court tomorrow morning.

Joseph J. Smith, charged with keeping his store in Waterloo street open after 7 o'clock on the night of July 25 was before the court, and was represented by E. S. Ritchie. Policeman Lucas told of going into the store on the night in question and seeing the defendant sell a pair of gloves.

Smith contended that the store belonged to his wife and not to him, and that the store was open for the purpose of allowing customers to go in and try on dresses. Reece Baxter contended that he was the only salesman in the store at the time of the sale, he was liable under the act.

The case against Joseph Weisel was also to have been taken up this morning, but did not come up. The court held that the Smith case was not at all a clear one, as the proprietor of the shop was not in the store at the time and that Mr. Smith was only acting as a clerk, that it would be better to let the matter stand over for one week and bring the both cases up together.

The recorder stated that the reports made under the summary conviction act by Chamberlain D. G. Lingley. "What I want to do," said the recorder, "is to get where we can test the validity of the provincial act in regard to the early closing. "I do not wish to have anybody have the matter settled definitely one and one, but I wish to let the matter rest until Friday morning next, 10 o'clock when both cases will be taken up."
